SHERMAN MARCH VETERAN DIES AT MYRTLE POINT

Joseph Noyes, Long a Resident of Coos County Succumbs After Several Months Illness

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: Joseph Noyes died at the Club Cafe rooms, after several months illness, about a week of which time he was confined to his bed. Mr. Noyes was born in Ohio in September, 1847. He enlisted in the Union Army in August, 1864, and served in Company A, 50th New York till the end of the war, taking part in Sherman's famous march to the sea. He came to Coos county with the James Matheny family in September, 1873, and has made his home here since with the exception of about a year which he spent at the Old Soldiers' Home at Sawtelle, California.
