COQUILLE, Ore., March 22.—At a meeting of the board of education of the Coquille city district all the present corps of teachers were re-elected and their monthly salaries fixed as follows:

The above figures indicate an increase of \$2.50 per month for the grade teachers and the three high school teachers, get an increase of \$5 per month.

Superintendent Chas. A. Howard was re-elected and his salary raised from \$1500 to \$1600.

J. W. Crites, principal of the high school, was also re-elected and his salary increased from \$1,000 to \$1,125.

Mr. Howard's term is for a full year; the rest for nine months.

### FLORENCE HOPES TO GET BRANCH LINE DONE SOON

Southern Pacific Will Build Spur If Porter Bros. Will Promise Sufficient Freight

FLORENCE, Ore., March 22.—The Southern Pacific Company has driven test pilings in the North Fork of the Siuslaw river, where it is proposed to erect a draw bridge for the branch railroad from Cushman to Florence, and the engineers have found a solid bottom where piling will remain when driven. They are reported to have found the bottom without going as deep as they expected to, according to J. W. Bergman, banker of Florence.

The line will be built, said Mr. Bergman, if the Tidewater Mill Company, which owns the Florence saw-mill, will promise to furnish certain amount of freight or if the company will grade the road and furnish the ties, the railway company in that case is to furnish the rails and lay them.

Mr. Bergman says there are reports that the mill will resume operations in the near future and the people of Florence are very optimistic as to the outlook for better business conditions.

### PENDLETON MEN OPPOSE CHOICE OF A. T. PARK

Object to Selection of Former Myrtle Point Man as Superintendent of Schools

The East Oregonian of Pendleton is making a vigorous fight on the selection of A. T. Park of Hermiston formerly of Myrtle Point, as superintendent of schools there and gives his record as follows:

"Myrtle Point, a small town in Coos county and which had a population of 836 in 1910, and Hermiston in this county, a town of about the same population, are by far the largest towns in which A. T. Park, who has been elected to the superintendency of the Pendleton schools, has ever taught. His only experience as a school man, other than the two Oregon towns, was in Minnesota according to his letters of application, where he states he was superintendent of the schools of Thomson, Wrenshall and Proctor in succession."
