BIG CATTLE LOSSES.

Heat Wave in Argentine Causes Many to Die. [By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.] BUENOS AIRES, March 23.—The Argentine is experiencing a phenomenal heat wave that has caused an enormous mortality among livestock. In the rich district of Venado Tuerto province of Santa Fe alone, from five to six thousand head of cattle have succumbed, involving a loss of nearly a million dollars to the ranch owners. The wheat yield, however, is remarkably large, and the coming crop promises to be good.
