SCHOOL BANKING

The school banking system was started Wednesday. Deposits for the opening day amounted to \$50.65. Depositors for the opening day numbered over 10 per cent of the grade enrollment. Some apparent advantages of the system follow:

- It gives an opportunity to the teacher for talking thrift.
- It affords a fixed time for making deposits.
- It removes the temptation to make withdrawals for slight reasons.
- It makes the child a personal depositor with the bank.
- It allows the child to open an account with any bank.
- It allows the child to continue his account with any bank in which he is now a depositor.
- It is somewhat competitive and so encourages the saving habit.
