Expected Soon.—Dr. Ira B. Bartle and wife, of North Bend, are expected home in a few days from Los Angeles, where Mrs. Bartle has spent a month while Dr. Bartle has been doing some postgraduate work in New Orleans.

Playing Tennis.—Some of the Coos Bay tennis players are having a tournament to start off the season. Yesterday Claude Thompson beat George Stephenson and I. R. Tower beat Warren Painter. This afternoon Charlie Hall is playing Frank Hague.

To Open New Movie.—G. J. Lemanski left this morning for Bandon, where on Saturday he will open the Orpheum Theater, of which he will take active charge. Mr. Lemanski has a good building there and an equipment enabling him to put on first-class movies.

Ships Machinery.—Archie Kruse has shipped to San Francisco the box factory machinery which he bought on the lower Coquille River and which he brought to North Bend. The machinery has been shipped to the Ely Machinery Company, which firm it is understood, will sell it for Mr. Kruse.

Chandlers Coming.—B. R. Chandler has received a letter from his father, W. S. Chandler, stating that he and Mrs. Chandler will arrive home next week from an extended stay in California. Their daughter, Mrs. Tremaine, who has been with them, will proceed to her home in Vancouver, B. C.

Many Petitions.—Many petitions are being circulated here by friends of the various aspirants for office.

Watt Short was circulating some for W. W. Cardwell for Judge; Walter Richardson for E. B. Tichenor for Joint Representative, and E. L. McClure of C. W. Fulton for Presidential convention delegate.

Has Typhoid.—Louis Nelson, employed in one of the camps near Allegany, came to Marshfield this morning for medical treatment. He was quite sick and was sent to Mercy Hospital. Dr. Horsfall says that he thinks Nelson is suffering

from typhoid but will not be able to definitely determine for a day or two.

Reigns Action.—Papers were served on Herbert Armstrong, local representative of the Southern Oregon Company today, in a suit brought by A. J. Mayce to foreclose on a delinquency tax certificate on a tract of land near Dora.

Name is Changed.—The name of the Coos Bay Development Company, with offices in the Coke building, has been changed to the Security Mortgage and Bonding company. The change it was stated has been sanctioned by the state Corporation Commission.

Initiate Two.—At a meeting at the Masonic Temple last evening, the Knights Templar degree was conferred on H. J. Kimball, Jr., and later the Knights of Malta Degree on Mr. Kimball and Warren Painter. There was a big turnout and a social time followed the lodge work.

Makes Final Survey.—E. J. Cantine, deputy state highway engineer, expects to leave tomorrow for Coquille, making his final survey of the road situation in Coos county. He has been for a second time over the roads in the north end of the county and expects now very shortly to return to Salem.

Would Oust Directors.—Judge Coke yesterday at Coquille, issued the order for a writ of mandamus in the case of Wood versus Covel and others, which involves a school fight in a district near Bandon, the plaintiff seeking to oust the school directors. Inasmuch as the petitioner did not appear yesterday the judge will have written briefs submitted to him.

Goes to Curry County.—John R. Smith, who has been working his mine property on South Inlet, was in the city today and left for Powers and from there will go to the Rock Creek country in Southern Coos and Northern Curry Counties. He took eight men with him and will mine in the same locality he worked last year. He will also hold his South Inlet mining claim.

Handles Sporting Goods.—James J. Richardson, scout for the Portland Beavers, is here with a line of Spaulding goods. He opened a new account with the Marshfield News Company and tomorrow he goes to Powers to see about outfitting the new baseball team there. He says that probably Carson and Lyle Bigbee, who are now in the Beavers spring training camp, will be "farmed" out this season to the Spokane Indians.

Pays Big Salvage.—Word has been received that the steam schooner Thomas L. Wand, belonging to J. H. Baxter of San Francisco and well known on Coos Bay, has paid \$10,000 salvage to the Pacific-Alaska Navigation Company. The Admiral Dewey of the latter line on Mar. 6, picked up the Wand off Cape Flattery when she was in a helpless condition. The repairs on the vessel amount to some \$15,000 and will be completed probably by April 19.

Inspected Station.—Supt. Otto Wellander, of the 13th district Coast Guard Service, has inspected the new station at Charleston Bay and has sent a favorable report into Washington. It is stated, Andrew Fouchey, who has superintended the building of the new station, has now gone up the coast. Mr. Wellander is inspecting the station there. The local crew will not move to the new quarters until the red tape has been gone through with, possibly the middle of next month.

To Adopt Child.—Mrs. A. L. Houseworth will leave Wednesday for Seattle, where she will adopt the infant daughter of a niece, who died a few weeks ago. The mother died soon after the child's birth and the young father has granted the request of Dr. and Mrs. Houseworth that they be given the baby. Mrs. Kretzer will probably accompany Mrs. Houseworth north, and Dr. Houseworth will meet them in Portland on their return and accompany them home to Coos Bay.

Says It's Hughes.—J. S. Barton, of Coquille, who has just returned from a trip to Roseburg, said this morning while on his way home, that everything over in the Willamette Valley and also in the East seems to sound like Hughes for the Republican Presidential nomination. He says the belief is that though Hughes will not allow his name to be used in the primaries, nevertheless the delegates will go un instructed to the Republican nomination and that he will not refuse the nomination if tendered him at that time.

Must Watch Awnings.—Now that the sun is coming out and good weather seem the order Chief Carter is making the rounds of the city to see that none of the awnings are

less than seven feet above the level of the sidewalk, as prescribed in a city ordinance.

Not Coming Now.—There is a report from Eugene that the University of Oregon Glee Club will not essay the trip planned for Coos Bay in April because "the railroad will not be completed in time." In all probability the students there have been misinformed as to the starting of the railroad. The report stated the waiters would probably come here later in the year.
