U. S. DETERMINED

INSISTS ON KNOWING ABOUT SINKING OF SHIPS

May Present All the Recent Incidents as One General Clear Cut Indictment

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) WASHINGTON, D. C., March 30.—The United States government today is using every means at its command to secure conclusive proof regarding the disasters which have overtaken the Sussex and other unarmed British ships, all carrying American citizens.

Some officials credit the suggestion that the German submarine commanders were acting under secret orders, such as were advocated by von Tirpitz, to torpedo every vessel approaching the British Isles. The United States, it is stated authoritatively, has determined upon the next step. Unless Germany makes some statement to cause the State Department to change its present intentions, all the recent incidents will be combined into one general indictment, which will make the issue clear cut.

BILL IS AMENDED

CHANGE MADE IN THE IMMIGRATION MEASURE

It Was Discovered That Russia Was Operated Against and This Feature is Removed

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) WASHINGTON, D. C., March 30.—An amendment was adopted to the immigration bill today modifying the Humphrey amendment adopted Tuesday, which proposed retaliation upon British Columbia for its exclusion of skilled and unskilled labor. It was discovered the amendment as drawn would operate against Russia, and the new amendment as adopted today would limit the application to British Columbia.

OUTLINES HIS PLAN

SECRETARY DANIELS CONFERS WITH HOUSE COMMITTEE

Tells His Idea of Navy's Part in National Preparedness Program for United States

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 30.—Secretary Daniels' view regarding the navy's part in the national preparedness plans was given today before the House naval committee. His own recommendations, based on his experience in the department and advice of many officers, looked to a total enlisted strength of 67,952 men. "In time of peace," he said, "I do not believe we can add 20,000 men to the navy in one year as has been suggested."

INVESTIGATION ON

EFFORT TO DETERMINE RESPONSIBILITY FOR WRECK

Federal, State and Railroad Officials are Looking Into Disaster on New York Central

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) CLEVELAND, O., March 30.—With 27 bodies recovered from yesterday's wreck of the three New York Central trains at Amherst, attention today was focused upon investigations by the Federal, state and railroad authorities to determine the responsibility. Of more than 40 injured, several are in a precarious condition today. Unofficial, but what are regarded as reliable reports, placed the number of dead at 30. The wreckage is not yet cleared away.

MR. AND MRS. INNES WILL BE MOVED

Former Oregon Couple Acquitted of Murder Charge at San Antonio—Fear Mob Violence

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) ATLANTA, Ga., March 30.—Georgia officials are on the way today to San Antonio to take charge of Victor E. Inne and wife, formerly of Oregon. The couple was acquitted at San Antonio of murdering two sisters, Mrs. Eloise Dennis and Miss Beatrice Nelms, and informed Governor Ferguson they feared mob violence if they were returned to answer an indictment for larceny after trust.

GERMAN SEARCHES PAPERS OF BRITISH VESSEL

Hid on Steamer Until She Passed Sandy Hook and Put Wireless Out of Commission

LEWIS, Delaware, Mar. 30.—Ernest Schuler, a German, held up the captain of the British steamer Matoppo shortly after the vessel passed Sandy Hook last night, bound from New York for Valdivostok with a cargo of munitions and war material. Schuler, who was a stowaway, put the wireless out of commission, locked the captain in his room all night and searched his papers and the ship's safe. The tank, the hoops and the water, when the tank is filled, will weigh 111,000 tons which is more than the weight of the center span of the big Southern Pacific bridge across Coos Bay.
