Express Made Trip—Capt. B. Latfin, of the Express, says that his craft was not damaged in striking the stern of the Tillamook yesterday so that it could not make the trip up South Coos River on its regular schedule. He said this morning his craft did not hit the Tillamook much of a blow and that the boat put back only a few minutes before leaving the dock again.

Call for Bids.—Six or seven local contractors have received from Washington part of the plans and specifications for the new wireless station for Coal Bank Inlet. The remainder of the plans may be secured by writing to San Francisco. The bids are to be opened by the Navy Department in Washington, May 2 and the contract will call for the completion of the work by December 15.

Coaches Are Over.—Word from North Inlet today was to the effect that six of the big coaches have been brought across the Umpqua and to the sidetrack at the head of the Inlet. The two engines were to come across today and trainmen said that very shortly now they will be brought down to Marshfield. From the present indications it is believed that early next week will see the starting of the train service.

Hatchery Going Up.—The Lakeside Public Fish Hatchery is rapidly taking shape, according to J. E. Hedges, who returned from there last evening. He said the building is partially erected and already T. J. Scammon has between 15,000 and 20,000 trout in the flumes. Mr. Hedges and daughter, Gwendoline, aged 12, started too late for the boat yesterday and so walked the entire distance from Lakeside to North Bend last evening, crossing the big bridge when it swung at 6 o'clock.

To Give Relief.—C. E. Larson, for almost two years the well known operator for the Western Union in this city, has been appointed relief manager of the company to aid in Oregon and Washington. J. W. Williams has arrived here to take the place of Mr. Larson under Manager Otto Schetter. A new ruling of the telegraph company allows every employee two weeks vacation. Mr. Larson will travel about relieving operators in these two states while they enjoy themselves. Mr. Schetter will have his vacation first, probably from April 1 to 15.

Memorial is Printed.—The Port of Coos Bay Commission has received the printed copies of the memorial that is to be presented to Congress, giving authentic data relative to the bar and to the inner harbor. This memorial contains a description of the resources drained by the Coos Bay district, data of the inward and outward bound cargoes for the last ten years and a history of harbor improvements, and ends with a plea that consideration be given the subject of further bar and harbor alterations.

Uneasy About Wreck.—Mrs. T. J. McPherson of Alberta, Canada, who is in the city visiting her sister, Mrs. Walter Wilson, felt some uneasiness as she feared that her husband might have been on one of the trains in the frightful collision which occurred on the New York Central railroad near Cleveland yesterday. The family is moving from Alberta to Chicago. Mr. Wilson had left for Chicago and expected to go to Cleveland and New York on business just about the time the accident happened. Mrs. Wilson has not heard from him in the past few days and she feared he might have been on one of the ill-fated trains. She will telegraph the railroad officials to learn if her husband was among any of the victims.

## A. G. AIKEN NOW OLDEST CITIZEN

A. G. Aiken is now the oldest pioneer of Coos Bay, according to Editor G. A. Bennett, who prints the following in his paper the Coos Bay news:  
"Since the death of Mrs. Lockhart on March 21, A. G. Aiken is now the oldest pioneer of Coos Bay. Mr. Aiken, who is at present in the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg, came to Coos Bay in the fall of 1854, just one year after Mrs. Lockhart's arrival here. He was born in Lawrence County, Pennsylvania, on January 12, 1837, and in 1853, when 16 years old, he crossed the plains with his brothers John and James with an ox team. They stopped for a short time in the Willamette Valley, then went to Washington Territory and from there came to Coos Bay. When the Rogue River Indian War broke out in 1855, Mr. Aiken joined Capt. Harris' company of volunteers and took part in that campaign.
