Beats are Good.—Autoists say that the roads to the beach, Sunset Bay and vicinity are in excellent condition and it is expected that many autoists will enjoy trips to morrow if the weather continues favorable.

Fill is Improving.—William Conter is hard at work with a team and scraper turning back the dirt into the Mill Slough drain ditch which, when completed, is going to add considerably to the looks of the Mill Slough area.

Is Recovering.—W. J. Gosney is again able to be about after several weeks' illness and is receiving greeting from his many friends. Mr. and Mrs. Gosney expect to leave in a few weeks for Grants Pass where they may spend the summer at the home of Mrs. Gosney's mother.

Exchange Cut Over.—The work of cutting over the exchange of the Coquille Valley Farmers' Telephone Company to that of the Coos & Curry Company at Coquille was successfully accomplished yesterday without any trouble whatsoever. The office of the former 'phone concern has been locked up for good.

Fares Go Up.—There was another chapter added to the new jitney legislation when this morning the Bunker Hill line increased its rates from five cents to ten cents for the

trip to and from the city. Walter Richardson said that he was forced to do it because of the fact the ordinance hits each one of his cars heavily and the price of repairs and tires and of oil has gone up considerably of late.

Rev. Olson Coming.—Rev. J. Richard Olson, former pastor of the Marshfield and North Bend Swedish Lutheran churches but for the last few years pastor of the Portland church, wired today that he will arrive here next week. It explains that much of the lands included in the grant is of such nature that it could not be lived upon by actual settlers, also that it has the right to sell the timber from the land and the same as it would any crop, and intimates that after this is done, the company would be willing to sell for \$2.50 an acre.

After investigation I believe that the Workmen's Compensation Act is one of the best and most beneficial pieces of legislation on our statute books and I shall strongly oppose any legislation either to repeal it or in anyway destroy or cripple its effectiveness.

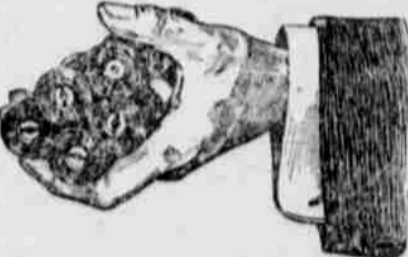

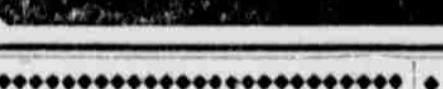
