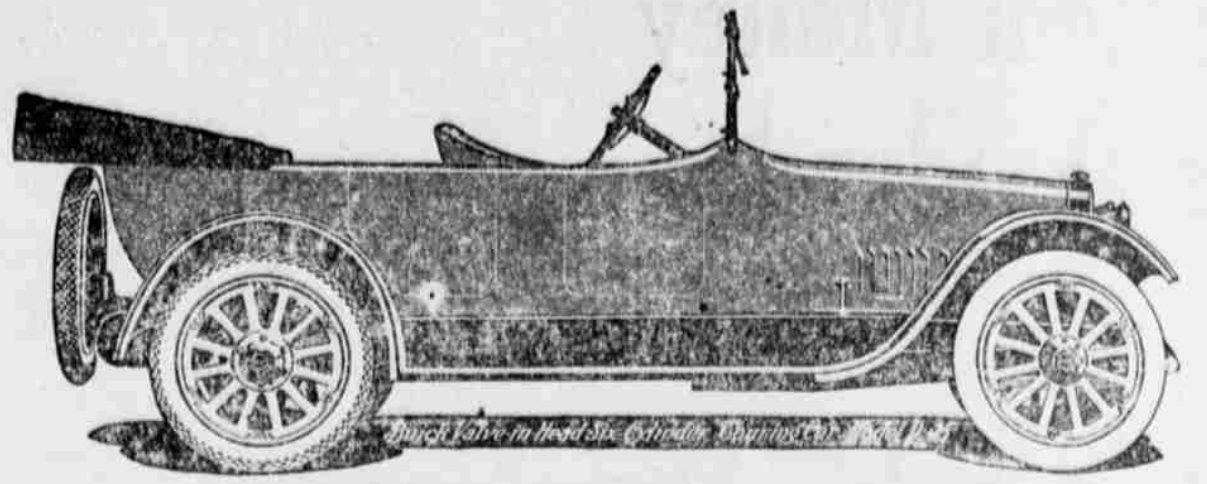
ASKS BIG DAMAGES
