

HAS NEW SERVICE OUTLOOK IS GOOD

WESTERN UNION ACTS AS PURCHASING AGENCY.

Will Buy for Customers at a Distance When Orders are placed by Wire.

The Western Union Telegraph Company announces that its offices are now prepared to execute small commissions, such as the purchase of flowers, candy, fruits, cigars, books, etc., for the accommodation of patrons at distant points. This is in effect an extension of the Western Union Money Transfer Service, and represents the largest development in the policy of the management of that company to place its nation-wide organization at the disposal of its patrons.

Will Make Purchases.
Under the plan now in effect, anyone who desires to arrange for the delivery of flowers or gifts, or remembrances of any kind, or for the transaction of any other small commission involving the disbursement of money at distant points, no longer needs to know someone at the distant point who will fill the order or execute the commission. All that is necessary is to wire the amount to the Western Union manager at the point of delivery, through the medium of the company's regular Money Transfer Service, and to incorporate in the transfer message requisite instructions regarding the purchase and delivery of the articles desired, or whatever other commission may be involved.

The service will be available at any of the places where the company's money order transfer service is in operation.

Has Many Uses.

Among the uses suggested are the delivery of candy, cigars, books, etc., as birthday and other remembrances, the delivery of flowers on birthdays, wedding anniversaries and in cases of illness or death, the delivery of baskets of fruits to friends and especially those departing on ocean trips, the delivery of theatre tickets, etc., all with the card of the sender enclosed—but Manager Schetter announces that the service practically covers anything that one may choose. In ordering anything that is not ordinarily delivered free of charge by local merchants, the delivery can be insured by paying 30 cents additional, for which sum delivery will be made by a uniformed Western Union messenger.

But so has North Bend and the outcome of the "talk battle" on Friday evening will be watched with great interest. The local team, composed of Alex Brandt and Merlin Chappelle, will have the negative side of the Swiss Military question, a fact which may put them at a disadvantage.

North Bend won the county debates and a short time ago decisively defeated the Albany high school. The team will probably leave here Friday on the train for Jefferson.

CHRIS RASMUSSEN SAYS BANDON WILL HAVE GOOD YEAR

Opening of Moore Mill Will Help Lower Coquille—Thinks Fifield Is Saved

Chris Rasmussen, a well known resident of Bandon, arrived here yesterday to look after some business matters. He said that the Geo. W. Moore mill had to delay its opening until today owing to some parts of the machinery failing to arrive on the Elizabeth. Everything else was in readiness.

He says Bandon will have a good year. The opening of the Moore mill, the jetty and harbor work, the improvements in the waterworks and other public work will give employment to a large number.

About the Postoffice
Mr. Rasmussen said that the term of the present postmaster at Bandon will not expire until September 1 so that the appointment will probably not be made as soon as some expected. Five are in the race. R. E. L. Bedillion, who has been away from there for the past year and a half, was reported a while back to be most favorably considered but Mr. Rasmussen doubts this report. Mr. Rasmussen says that he thinks that postmasters should be either under civil service or elected by the communities in which they serve.

Mr. Rasmussen said that Col. Rosa would probably not be a candidate for state senator although many were urging him. Col. Rosa said that he was too old to aspire to it. Mr. Rasmussen said that he doubted if C. R. Wade would come out for the legislature on the Democratic ticket although many were urging him.

Fifield Saved

Mr. Rasmussen said that it now seemed certain that the Fifield would be saved. He said that the ship has been hauled up on the beach until she is out of all danger so far as storms are concerned and they are hopeful that she can be repaired and floated out again before long.

PROPOSITIONS WILL BE ON THE BALLOT

This Year There Will Be Six Amendments and Three Measures Referred to People

SALEM, Ore., April 4.—At least six initiative petitions proposing constitutional amendments and laws and three measures referred to the people by the last Legislature will be on the ballot at the election next November. Copies of these nine measures are now on file with the Secretary of State.

Initiative petitions which will be on the ballot are as follows:
To provide for one day of rest in seven and setting apart Sunday as a day of public rest, and excepting necessary occupations and employments. Proposed by the Weekly Rest Day League, of Portland.
To abolish Sunday closing law, repealing section 2125 of title 19, Lord's Oregon Laws. Initiated by Independent Retailers' Association, of Portland.
To prohibit compulsory vaccination and medical treatment. Initiated by Lora C. Little, of Portland.
Proposing law to "protect salmon in the Columbia river and its tributaries and barring fishing with seines, traps or fish wheels." Initiated by Clackamas County Fishermen's Union.

To remove county seat of Jefferson county from Culver to Madras. Proposed by "Madras for County Seat Club."
The three proposed constitutional amendments referred to the people by the Legislature are Senate Joint resolutions Nos. 12, 18 and 22.
No. 12 proposes amending section 11 of article 5 of the constitution so as to give the governor power to veto single items in appropriation bills.
No. 8, amending article 9 of the constitution, would exempt from taxation until 1935, except taxes for state purposes, all vessels of 50 tons and more capacity engaged in coast or foreign trade, which are registered in Oregon.
No. 22 proposes the repeal of section 6, of article 2, of the constitution, which reads: "No negro, Chinaman or malatto shall have the right of suffrage."
