Coos Bay booklets issued by the Southern Pacific Company, have arrived here, and are now ready for distribution. They are exceedingly well illustrated and brief paragraphs explain the country through which the railroad traverses coming here from Eugene.

Willis H. Jenkins, traveling passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, said this morning that the company intends to advertise this section throughout the United States. He brought several of the booklets with him.
