LINE COMBINED

The North Pacific Steamship Co. and California South Sea Navigation Co., of San Francisco, have effected a combination, according to word received here by Agent Cushing. The present indications are that this will not affect the service of the Breakwater and the Kilburn. The companies will retain their separate names, but go together in extending their freight service to Mexican, Central and South American ports as far as Valparaiso.
