**Loggers Are Registered.**—J. T. Brand and Ben Fisher yesterday visited at the camp of the Blue Ridge Tigers on Daniels Creek and also at Camp 1 on South Coos River. They signed up about 100 voters and came back reporting they had been royally treated.  
**Will Give Lecture.**—Rev. J. Richards Olson of Portland, who has been in the city, was urged to return and give his illustrated lecture "The Paradise of the Pacific" which deals with the islands. He promised that he would come back in the near future and give the lecture.

**Hearing Tomorrow.**—The hearing of Christ Grohs, of North Bend, has been postponed until tomorrow morning at 10 a. m. The state expects to have another witness at that time. It is believed that the case will be hard fought and both sides are preparing for a strenuous siege.

**To Go East.**—Because of ill health Miss Corning, for three years the very efficient teacher of the first grade at the Central school, has resigned her position and expects very shortly to return to her home in Iowa to visit. Temporarily her place will be taken by Mrs. L. D. Gordon. During her stay here Miss Corning made a great many friends who will be sorry to see her leave.

**Council Meets Tonight.**—There is a meeting of city fathers this evening, though there is little else than the routine business in sight. It is expected that some street matters will be up for consideration and there is a possibility that the raving of Central avenue from Fourth through to 14th street will come up, maybe for definite action. The council this week went over the street with City Engineer A. B. Gidley.

**Are Making Fill.**—Street Commissioner Albrecht for several days has had men working on West Elrod avenue, clearing off the dirt slides that have covered the sidewalks in that section. This dirt is being dumped on Donnelly avenue where part of the street dropped down onto the flats a few weeks ago. It is expected that this street can be built up again shortly and the planking put down.

**Mine Is on Fire.**—It is said that for about three weeks a section of the mine at Libby has been on fire. Men are now trying to put in a bulkhead to shut out the air from the shaft, thus smothering the fire. It is believed the fire was occasioned by a lack of ventilation. Black damp is also said to have been experienced there for a time. Workmen, however, are still at work in another section of the mine, getting out coal.

**First Mail Out.**—The first mail from Coos county via the Southern Pacific left this morning on the new mail schedule for Eugene and the outside. At 3:30 p. m. the incoming mail arrives. The business mail will be distributed this evening, also the general delivery window will be open until 7 p. m., but because there are no delivery to the residence sections until the following morning. Hereafter two mails from the Coquille Valley will arrive here daily, one at 9:20 a. m. and the other at 5:25 p. m.

**Proves a Husky Corpse.**—In some way the rumor spread about the city yesterday that Edward Joehnk had died. "Suddenly dropped dead from heart failure" ran the report. Possibly the name was confused with that

of Mr. Yates, of Libby, who passed away suddenly on Saturday evening. At any rate there were expressions of regret and this morning as Joehnk passed along the street on his way to his office he was halted no less than a dozen times and congratulated on his being able to be about again. Visitors came to his office expecting to find craps on the door, but the "live corpse" was as husky as ever.
