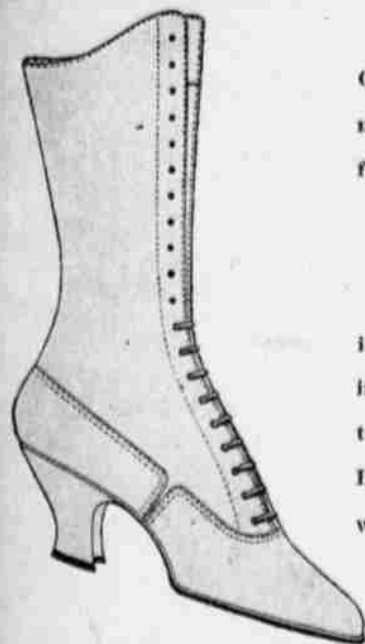

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TIMBERMAN VISITS FAVOR WOOD BLOCK MAKES A FAST RUN

FRANK BOUTIN LOOKS OVER EXTENSIVE HOLDINGS

Denies Any Sale Is Completed and Brings Encouraging Word of Eastern and Coast Lumber Situations

Not in months and years has the lumber business showed such an upward trend as it does right now, according to Frank Boutin, holder of extensive timber lands in Coos county, who arrived on the train last evening. Today he made a quick trip to Beaver Hill to look after some of his lands. He is on his way back to Bayfield, Wisconsin, after a visit in California.

"Last August the lumber business began to get better with us back east," he said this morning. "Since then it has been going up, a little at a time, but always in the encouraging direction." He said that he found the outlook in California more promising than it has been for a long time.

A corner of the Boutin tract was sold last year to the North Bend Mill and Lumber company and is now being logged at Beaver Hill by the McDonald and Vaughn company. It was there Mr. Boutin went this morning, accompanied by George Stephenson, manager of the North Bend Mill and Lumber company.

Mr. Boutin denied there was any thought of a sale or that one is even in prospect. He said that he only wanted to "take a peek" in here on Coos Bay and see that things are going on as they should be.

EASTERN READER OF TIMES ENDORES SMITH'S POSITION.

Says We Should Profit By Experience of Others—Coos Bay Will Be Great Pacific Seaport.

HONOLULU, Pa., April 6, 1916.

Editor of Coos Bay Times. I observe that C. A. Smith has called your attention to the wooden block pave. I wish to again call your attention to the same subject, for to make mistakes in paving is expensive for any city. The wooden block pave is no experiment. The streets of Washington, the capital of our country, were rescued from mud and nastiness and made smooth and beautiful by wooden block pave. Alexander Shepherd, the man who put it through was hounded out of office in disgrace, by critics who did not know a good thing, but as years rolled by, the permanency of his work testified to the wisdom of the plan.

Washington is one of the most beautiful cities in the world, and that which adds as much as anything else, is her beautiful wooden-paved streets. New York, with her immense traffic, has more or less of wooden block pave. Wood is cheap at Coos Bay; both fir and red cedar, in my opinion, would make durable wooden paving. They have a creosote treatment for the blocks, and of course they are laid tight together on a concrete base.

You had better pave a short distance on your main street each year and in a few years you will have good streets, without making it burdensome. Excepting as a temporary makeshift, don't spend much money on plank roads.

I congratulate you on the near completion of the railroad you have waited for so long. You will have your celebration, then for a time possibly you will be disappointed. Why? It takes some time to adjust trade relations between communities that are suddenly brought into new trade conditions by a railroad or any other means of communication. You have had a seaport but there was no opportunity for the wholesale merchant, because he could not distribute his goods in the interior. That barrier is now removed and some day a wholesaler from San Francisco or Portland, and probably some home man, will establish a wholesale distributing house at Coos Bay. It is only a matter of time.

The coal in your mines is needed in the Willamette, Umpqua and Rogue River valleys, but this coal must be delivered to towns and people that have used wood must get coal stoves and be taught that coal is cheaper and better than wood. And it all takes time, but be patient and persevering. Everything is gradually coming your way, and the peninsula embraced by Coos Bay will be occupied by a great Pacific seaport.

LAST TRIP OF NANN SMITH IS BEST ONE

Thirty-three Hours from Bar to Bar—Many Lumber Vessels Seen Along the Coast

A letter from a passenger to San Francisco says: The Nann Smith made one of the best runs on her last trip from Coos Bay to San Francisco that she ever made. Her time was about thirty-three hours from bar to bar. It was as smooth as a mill pond all the way down and the seas and slight wind were both in her favor.

The activity in lumber and shipping was attested by the numerous small schooners plying along the coast. In the thirty-three hours, the Nann met no less than twenty vessels bound northward for cargoes. Four of the vessels were grouped in the pace of a mile. They were led by the Fair Oaks and Simpson, headed for Coos Bay, with the Vance and another of the Hammond Lumber company's boats close behind.

Dick Rogers of Coos Bay Tells About Mexican Border

First hand information about the Mexican border conditions was gained by Dick Rogers, formerly of Coos Bay and who was a driver on the Gorst and King auto line for a long time. Several months ago he went to California to be associated with Mr. Gorst there and recently went to Winfield, Kansas, to visit his parents. On the way back Rogers visited Columbus, N. M., and other border points and went across the international line.

Dick saw the real thing in the way of border excitement and was not satisfied with what he heard but took a look into Mexico to investigate a little on his own account. Friends here have received post cards from Dick mailed in Mexico during the past few weeks. The Evening Free Press of Winfield, a paper on which Dick was employed as a reporter before he came to Oregon, contains an interesting account of his experiences.

Expect Fighting

The paper says: "The American soldiers want to go into Mexico, clean up the country, make it habitable for natives, foreigners, Americans and everybody. Neither Villa nor Carranza can trust their followers and eventually the American army will be fighting the whole country instead of half of it. This is the opinion Dick Rogers brings home from the border where he spent several weeks following the Columbus raid.

Graft Is Strong

"According to Mr. Rogers the best fighting men in Mexico are in Lower California. The soldiers have a military bearing, dress alike and have uniforms. They support the rulers of Mexico but keep the import duties and take the gambling raffle and divide it among themselves and a few of the authorities. Sometimes their position is a little embarrassing for they have had to acknowledge allegiance to two rulers in a single day but they got by. The country is better because there has not been so much bloodshed and warfare as in other parts of Mexico.

Was at Columbus

"Dick reached Columbus shortly after the raid. Evidences of the raid were present everywhere. The buildings were shot up and even then dead Mexicans could be found. He picked up a number of pictures showing the disaster wrought by the raid. South of Columbus the hatred of Americans is so great that Mexicans

Visited Juarez

Telling of a trip Rogers made across the border the newspaper says: "Dick was warned not to go across the international bridge. He did not at night but did in the day time. He found a guide who would also guard him and who could talk English. He hired him for \$50.00 Mexican money for a day, about \$3.00 gold. They visited the bull ring, mission, cathedral and prison, beside the stores and restaurants.

"While in Juarez Dick walked down the middle of the street not risking the crowds on the sidewalks. In the city of 17,000 he saw five Americans and they, like himself, were sight-seers.

"Dick found an American in the Mexican prison, he looked starved and wasted. He said he could get nothing to eat."

Rogers' general conclusions were that the border Americans suspected both Carranza and Villa and expected that eventually there would be war with the whole of Mexico.
