C. A. Dooley slashed his big toe with an axe while cutting down a tree and is laid up as a result.

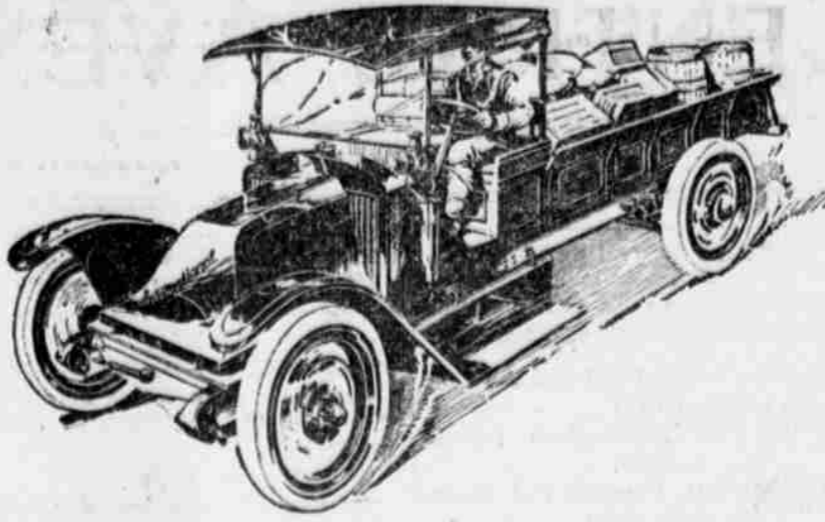
J. H. Hart, who has been in Coos county for several weeks, was joined last week by his wife and two young daughters from Washington, and they expect to reside here permanently.
