Cannot Export Crabs.—There has been much said of late regarding the slipping of crabs, crabs and fish from Coos Bay to Willamette Valley points. Attention has been brought to the fact that under the 1915 laws of the state legislature it is impossible to ship fresh crabs from Coos Bay and the canned product cannot go outside of the state.
