MOCK TRIAL

A very interesting mock trial was held by "Congress" on the evening of April 11. The purpose was to increase the members' knowledge of trial proceedings held by the House of Representatives at Washington, D. C.

Charnier Wright, defendant. George Hongell, Clerk. A jury was chosen from the members of the school.

Congressman Wright was charged with accepting a bribe of \$125,000 from the Remington Arms Co. The attorneys for the prosecution attempted to support the charge by showing that the defendant had lived very extravagantly and was possessed of a character not above accepting a bribe. The attorneys for the defendant immediately introduced evidence showing that the defendant had received a large sum of money from the Standard Oil Co., returns from an Oklahoma Oil strike in which he, the defendant, was interested. The jury returned a verdict of not guilty. Many amusing incidents occurred during the progress of the trial and on the whole a very enjoyable and instructive evening was reported.

COUNTY ORATORICAL CONTEST

The High Schools of the county will compete in an oratorical and declamatory contest next Friday night at the Auditorium of the High School building. This has been an annual event for a number of years. It is probably the most interesting competitive inter-school contest in the county. Marshfield people who heard the local inter-class contest last week may well expect this coming one to be much more superior to that. The Coos River Consolidated School will have a representative this year.

This contest is a dual one in that boys compete against boys and girls against girls. The boys choose oratorical selections; the girls give declamations.

The boys have competed for the present trophy cup—the McCormac Cup—named after the giver, Dr. J. T. McCormac of Marshfield, in four previous contests. For the first two years, the contest was single and each school might be represented by girl or boy. It was then enlarged and made dual, as at present, so that each school is represented by two contestants—a girl and a boy—the girls competing together and the boys likewise.

The girls' part of the contest is therefore two years old and they compete for the "Association Cup."

1914, at Bandon, boys.—1st, Earl Leslie, Coquille; 2nd, Chester Isaacson, M. H. S., '13.

Girls.—1st, Miss Eva Hansen, M. H. S., '16; 2nd, Miss Doris Peoples, Coquille.

1915, at North Bend.—Boys, 1st, Myrten Tyrrell, Coquille; 2nd, Ludwig Stone, M. H. S., ex '17.

Girls.—1st, Anna Truman, North Bend.

The trophy cups are awarded permanently to the school that first wins three victories not necessarily in succession. It is therefore evident that a victory for Coquille this year means permanent ownership by Coquille of the McCormac Cup. Coquille has a good record for oratory, she is the owner of the Frye Cup, one of the finest secondary school trophies that one can imagine, named for the giver, a Mr. Frye of North Bend. Coquille won that cup by three victories in succession. Will she repeat this year?

Marshfield will be represented this year by William McDonald and Miss Ruth Dungan.
