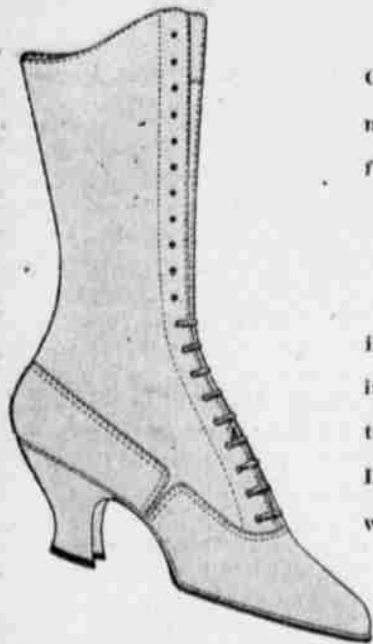

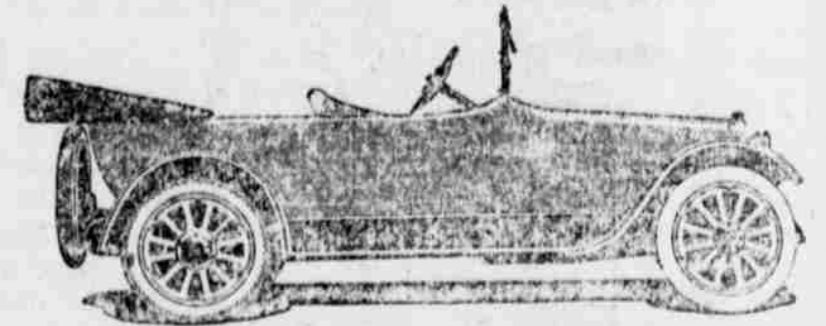
### WILL SHIP TIES
