FUNERAL OF MRS. HOLMES HELD SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Services Conducted at Home of Son in North Bend and Burial in Marshfield

The funeral of Mrs. Laurena Holmes was held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the residence of her son, R. C. Holmes in North Bend. The services were conducted by Rev. A. S. Hisey, pastor of the Methodist church and the burial was at the Odd Fellows cemetery in Marshfield.

The minister read a short obituary of the life of the deceased. Mrs. Holmes' maiden name was Laurena Sutton and she was born at Chagrin Falls, Ohio, Nov. 29, 1837. With the Sutton family she moved to Benton county, Minn., after the Civil war and it was there that she met and married Condon C. Holmes on Sept. 3, 1870. There were two children, Ruth C. Holmes, of North Bend, and a daughter, Minnie Holmes who died in 1890.

About 1888 the family moved to Walla Walla, Wash., and Mr. Holmes died there three years later. Thirteen years ago Mr. Holmes with her son and his family moved to North Bend shortly after the city had been started.

Mrs. Holmes had been in poor health for many years and over five years ago suffered a stroke of paralysis. A second stroke was the direct cause of her death. She joined the Methodist church early in life and became affiliated with the North Bend congregation in 1907 and was a faithful member.
