ROAD WILL BE GIVEN THE COAST GUARD CREW

Road Is To Extend From Station Along Bluffs South of Entrance of Bay

Authority has been granted for the building of a road from the Coast Guard station at Charleston Bay along the bluffs to be used by the crew in the event of a wreck. The road will be a great benefit in such an emergency. The matter is explained in a letter to J. A. Smith, secretary of the North Bend Chamber of Commerce from Representative Hawley. The letter follows:

"Since writing you on the first instant with reference to the construction of a road by the United States Coast Guard from its station along the edge of the bluff overlooking the south entrance to Coos Bay, over which to transport the station apparatus in case of a wreck in that vicinity, as I have been strongly urged, the Captain Commandant of the Coast Guard has been giving the matter his attention. By his letter under date of Saturday, the 8th instant, he advised me that the report of the District Superintendent has been received and that authority for the construction of the road has been issued. I am very glad that the action we desired has been taken."

IN COUNTY COURT

MANY MATTERS ARE DISPOSED OF BY OFFICIALS

Road Improvements and Other Questions Up For Consideration at Last Meeting

The county court at the last session disposed of many different matters which came up. Some of the most important, according to the Coquille Valley Sentinel were the following:

William Stauff, Clyde Little and George Hampton appeared in behalf of the road from Fishtrap to Hall's creek which they claimed had become impassable. They thought the re-location of 2,000 feet of this road would greatly relieve the situation there. The matter was referred to the county roadmaster. The application of R. L. Weekly for the improvement of the Cooper Bridge road, on a dollar for dollar basis between the local people and the county, was continued for further consideration.

The District Attorney was directed to commence proceedings to force Harry Hess to complete his contract on the township line road south from Bandon. This should have been finished last July.

Alex H. Austin was given a contract to construct 75 rods of new roadway at \$10 a rod on a part of the Coos Bay wagon road re-location.

The claim of W. Harmon, of the Lee neighborhood, for \$82.75 for damages to his residence and fields alongside the road, caused by blasting in clearing the right of way of the wagon road, was referred to the county roadmaster for a report. The contract for wiring all the old buildings at the county farm was awarded to F. E. McKenna on a labor and material basis.

April 24 was set as the date for a hearing on the petitions now being circulated for a road bond election.

The allowance to Mrs. Dilla J. Ewing, of Bandon, from the Indigent fund was increased from \$10 to \$15 a month. The allowance to Mrs. G. F. Newman, of Coquille, from the same fund was increased from \$10 a month to \$15.

J. D. Laird offered to take care of the road through the canyon beyond his place on the Coos Bay wagon road for \$600 per annum, but the bid being considered too high was not accepted.

Ed Abernathy reported 80,000 feet of road lumber already cut on the contract for 100,000 given him last year, and was awarded a contract for 10,000 feet more.

C. A. Gray, A. E. Alder and L. F. Price appeared in behalf of the proposed Sumner-Coos City road, but were informed that there were no appropriations from which anything could be provided for that road this year unless the bond issue carried.

W. A. Gright, living near Gravel Ford, wanted the county to take care of the bridge over the North Fork known as the "Bright bridge" and assume its maintenance for the future, but the court did not see fit to accede to his request.
