BAND RESURRECTED

TRUSTEES CHAMBER OF COMMERCE GUARANTEE \$200

To Be Given At Rate of \$50 a Month—Expect Reimbursement from Celebration Fund

Trustees of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce have voted to restore the Coos Bay band. They will guarantee \$200 at the rate of \$50 a month for the musicians, organization to be made at once. The trustees stated they expect to be reimbursed for this sum from Marshfield's share of the railroad celebration fund.

The action was taken after Ben Fisher, at the last meeting of the Chamber, outlined the matter, stating the musicians were willing to organize for \$50 a month and asking that this sum be guaranteed them.

Inasmuch as the celebration is coming in July the trustees said they feel it necessary to have a band on hand. They did not state, however, as to whether or not the band will charge the regular rates for their playing during the days of the festivities.
