THREE SUITS FILED AGAINST COOS, ALL FOR MONEY

Ferryman Claim 3,632 Hours of over-time and \$2,087—Timber Company Wants Back \$167,000

Three suits have been filed against Coos county within the past few days. Two of them are for amounts of \$2,000 and \$2,087 and the third amounts to practically a retrial of the case of the Menasha Woodware company against Coos county, the First National Bank and Bennett Banks, of Marshfield.

In June, of 1914, Mrs. Libby English came bumping down a county road, two and one half miles south of where Powers now is. The spring wagon had hard going evidently, for the complaint of Mrs. English declares she was at last thrown out by a jolt and permanently injured. She alleges that never again can she walk but a few steps at a time and for this she asks \$2,000 of Coos county because of the condition of the road. W. C. Hinman brings the action.

Ferryman Want Overtime

John W. McNair for three years and one month was ferryman at Coquille. He claims that the state law prescribes eight hours as a legal working day, but that he worked nine hours daily and the same on Sunday. Hence, he is suing for 2,412 hours of overtime. His partner, C. H. Dondono, who has assigned his claim to McNair claims 1,221 hours of overtime. The suit is for \$2,087.

On January 1, 1916 McNair lost his job. It went to a lower bidder. Inasmuch as each month of the three years and one month he has presented himself to the county clerk, has received and has cashed his warrant for a certified amount, District Attorney Liljeqvist believes he has lost a legal claim for overtime.

Seeking Tax Money

The Menasha Woodware company six weeks ago tried unsuccessfully to get back \$167,000 held by the county till back taxes are paid. The complaint has been the new action started. This will be heard in Portland. The county has started to foreclose on these lands for the amount of the back taxes of several years, the interest and penalties.

PLAN IMPROVEMENTS AT PANAMA CANAL

PANAMA, April 18.—The building Division of the Panama Canal has drawn plans for operations next year involving the expenditure of \$10,000,000 provided Congress appropriates the money.

Plans are made for 75 new two and four family frame houses for employes; hotels at Ancon, Balboa, Balboa Shops and at Cristobal; several new school houses and about 100 small frame cottages. The largest of the new school houses is to be built at Balboa which now is the capital of the Canal Zone. It is to be the High School and will replace the present wooden building which does not conform with the remainder of the buildings in the town.

The United States Army also contemplates the erection of many new frame buildings for quarters. The Army already has constructed many new buildings at Military Heights, east of Balboa proper, and at Corozal where the cavalry, artillery and engineer detachments have their barracks.
