### MARKET UNCERTAIN ISSUE ON BALLOT DRIVEN ON BEACH

#### MARKET AWAITS SETTLEMENT OF PRESENT WAR SCARES

Arno Merceen, of the C. A. Smith Company, Returns From San Francisco

Due to the uncertainties of the present negotiations with Germany the lumber market is not quite as strong right now as it was a month ago, in the report of Arno Merceen, of the C. A. Smith company, who returned yesterday afternoon, via train, from San Francisco. He says that because of the unsettled conditions builders are holding up, fearing to enlarge and expand until they can see what is going to happen. However, Mr. Merceen said that the company is able to place the output of the mills quite readily and that the resumption of the six day schedule is dependent upon the logging situation.

**Extension of Railroad**  
Asked about the Oregon Logging Railroad company incorporated at Salem the other day for \$100,000, in which he was mentioned together with Dave Nelson as being interested parties, Mr. Merceen said it is nothing more than the extension of the present Smith-Powers logging road beyond Powers and further back into the timber. The present purpose, he said, is to secure right-of-way.

#### MAY TRY AGAIN

J. E. Montgomery, returned from Bandon this morning, stated that at 1 o'clock yesterday morning a pull was taken on the Fifth without success, and again yesterday noon, but the tide was not high enough. He says the marine men do not seem to expect to abandon the attempt without another trial after new moorings have been rigged. Genereau in transferring from the laqua to the tug received a thorough ducking, being dropped into the sea during the process.

### ROADS BONDS OF \$362,000 NOW UP TO VOTERS

#### Petitions Approved by County Court—Apportionment of Issue, if Passed, is Shown

On the official ballot in the May primaries will be the \$362,000 road bond issue. Judge Watson this morning phoned Charles Hall that the petitions are all O. K. and the head of the Good Roads Association heaved a sigh of relief. In a series of meetings held over the county this week J. E. Montgomery says that he found considerable enthusiasm for the issue. He prepared figures showing how the \$362,000 bond issue, if passed, would be used.

It is explained that the \$62,800 contract awarded lately to E. G. Perham for the road between Marshfield and Coquille will be paid for out of the \$145,000 appropriation above listed, if the bonds pass. Otherwise it comes out of the general road fund.

He was enthusiastic, in dead earnest; he wanted something so badly he ran to secure it. "Some of you pikers are cheating me out of a mighty good dinner.
