Up Goes Rate Again.—Now comes the word from Portland that the lumber freight rates between the Columbia and San Francisco has jumped another 25 cents a thousand feet. The quotations are now \$5.50 a thousand to San Francisco and \$6.50 a thousand for San Pedro and other southern California ports. Not long ago the quotations were \$3.50 and \$4 and have been steadily going up since then with the end not yet in sight. Following the San Francisco fire the rates soared to \$8 and \$9 a thousand, but only for a short time. The larger coasting boats are now being sent off shore, a fact that makes bottoms scarce.
