FISHERMEN ON HAND

Salmon Season on Lower Rogue Has Started

Telling of the start of the fishing season on Rogue River the Gold Beach Globe says:

The banks of the Rogue River had the appearance of an army encampment Friday night, with salmon nets substituted for guns. Every point had a fire upon it, with its accompanying group of fishermen, waiting for midnight and the commencement of the fishing season of 1916.

There are not a great many fish in the lower river, most of the first run having gone on.

The Wedderburn cannery is running and the Seaborg cannery will probably start about the first of the month.

New Coast Guard Station on Coos Bay is Occupied



CREW'S QUARTERS AT CHARLESTON BAY

The members of the Coos Bay Coast Guard station are occupying their new quarters at Charleston Bay, right at the entrance of the harbor.

From the new boathouse the boats can be launched into the bay and at this point there is a concrete breakwater to protect in rough weather the place where the lifeboat must be launched. In case of heavy breakers coming in over the bar the boats can be launched without any difficulty.

The buildings are all under the shelter of Coos Head, the big point which forms the south side of the bay entrance. The boat house is necessarily more exposed than the other structures. The residences are in a beautiful cove, where they get none of the winds from the ocean, and at the same time are only a short distance to the boathouse, so the crew can be put in action at once. There is a fine residence for the captain and a large house for the men, and several residences for married members of the crew. A private waterworks has been installed and the residences have every convenience.

One great advantage is the fact that the new station is on the same side of the bay as the city, and can be reached by wagon road. The old station could only be reached by boat, which was some inconvenience in the way of transporting supplies.
