MANY WILL SERVE MAKES SHORT TRIP

CHIEF ENGINEER HOOD, OF S. P. LOOKS OVER LINE

On his first trip through via rail—Believed to Have Looked Over Depot Site—Back Yesterday

On his first through trip to Coos Bay via rail, William Hood, chief engineer of the Southern Pacific, accompanied by Mrs. Hood, arrived here late Saturday afternoon.

He asserted that his trip here had no meaning. "Just looking the road over," he said. However, it was noticeable that he made a survey of the land bordering the South Pacific tracks between the Smith Terminal dock and south to the company holdings.

It is believed that this trip was for the new depot site will be, though Mr. Hood would vouchsafe nothing in this direction.

Asked as to whether or not there is a new date for the completion of the Umpqua bridge, he said there is not. "The latter part of July is still the tentative date. This allows us plenty of time for any unforeseen happenings which I hope do not happen. But you never can tell in construction."

Cannot Help Mail Delay Mr. Hood said that every effort is now being made to hasten the finishing of the bridge and the opening of through service. The present delay of the mail at the Umpqua crossing, he said is unavoidable and will probably continue until the bridge is done. "It would not pay to go to any expense for further equipment for this is only a temporary service."

Not Yet Certain There had been talk that maybe the latter part of June would see the bridge swinging. Mr. Hood was not certain of this. He said, however, that as soon as the middle span is in and the draw completed that it will be possible to "shoo fly" the rest of the distance and not have to wait for the remainder of the steel to be in.

On the last trip in here Mr. Hood came via rail as far as the lower end of Lake Tabkenitch, there being a gap of some three miles from there to the Umpqua yet uncovered by rails. On this side the track was only within about three or four miles of Reedsport.
