FIFIELD IS BROKEN UP INTO MANY PARTS NOW

May Save Which Or Two—Capt. Generaux Still There—Wreckage Is Strewing The Beach

Not into two, but many times two pieces has the wrecked Fifield been broken, according to Verlin Parker, who came there this morning. Bits of wreckage have been strewn all up and down the beach and very shortly there will be nothing left of the craft but a mass of spars and wrecked machinery.

The wrecking schooner Ina has gone back to San Francisco, having left Bandon on Monday. Capt. Generaux, of Portland, is still there. It is possible that a winch or two will be saved. It is said the boat hammered continually in the sea during the weeks she was on the shore, straining all her timbers and fastenings and then when the supreme test came she turned, with her nose pointed against the rock jetty and ready to crumble to pieces, much to the surprise of the men who had expected to get her off.

PORTS SEND DELEGATE TO WASHINGTON, D. C.

L. E. Bean Will Be At National Capital to Further Amendment to O. and C. Bill

EUGENE, Ore., April 26.—L. E. Bean of this city was chosen at a meeting of the newly organized Oregon Coast Port Federation as a delegate to go to Washington, D. C., to work for the amendment to the proposed Oregon and California land grant bill in order to allow ports along the coast of Oregon, which are largely dependent upon taxes from the grant lands for improvements to harbors, a share of the money from the sale of the lands. Mr. Bean will leave Eugene the latter part of the week and remain until some action is taken on the bill in congress. The meeting was attended by representatives from nearly every port along the coast.

TESTIMONY HEARD

WITNESSES EXAMINED IN TREADGOLD CASE TODAY

All Excepting Three of Defendants Are Non-Suited—Trial Moving Slowly Today

(Special to The Times) COQUILLE, Ore., April 26.—The damage suit of Treadgold against Mitchell progressed slowly today. Yesterday the case was non-suited as to all defendants excepting A. R. O'Brien, O. W. Briggs and Detective W. J. Mitchell.

The defendants freed from the charge of libel were: Detective L. G. Carpenter, Joe Coach, B. L. Noller, H. C. Freeman, J. Murray and George A. Gage. Witnesses today Those who testified on the stand today in behalf of the plaintiff were N. C. McLeod of North Bend, J. H. Hunt of Bandon, County Judge James Watson and W. L. Beach, M. C. Maloney of The Times and H. W. Young of the Coquille Valley Sentinel were also on the stand and this afternoon W. A. Pettit of the Roseburg Review was also on the stand. The newspaper men were asked about the publication of articles in the newspapers that they represented.

Changes Pleadings Early in the proceedings yesterday the plaintiff was forced to change his pleadings to charge only libel, thus eliminating slander. The judge decreed that each one of these would have to be a separate action.

Yesterday Mr. Treadgold testified on his own behalf. A note book used by Detective Mitchell was introduced as evidence. Detective Mitchell told on the stand that he was hired for \$12 a day and expenses by Joe Coach.

A. R. O'Brien was one of the witnesses yesterday. In The Court Room In the court room yesterday sat Mrs. G. T. Treadgold, together with a brother of the plaintiff. Further back to the rear sat Mrs. Joe Coach and several friends who are directly interested in the case.

Not True Bills No true bills were reported by the grand jury late yesterday afternoon for Mrs. May Carlisle, of Myrtle Point, charged with adultery, and H. J. Paulson, charged with passing a bogus check in Bandon many months ago. They were both freed of the charges.

WANT FREE DOGS

Frank Horton Introduces A Petition About the City

A petition is being circulated today by Frank Horton asking that the council not pass an ordinance against allowing dogs to run free in the streets. It is stated that dog owners who pay their licenses should be granted permission to let their hounds be at large. At the meeting of the council last Monday evening the city attorney was authorized to draw up an ordinance forcing owners to keep dogs tied up, after it had been shown that in several instances they had been guilty of disorderly acts.

INJURIES SERIOUS

The injuries sustained by Capt. McNaught while at the Fifield wreck at Bandon were quite serious. The Portland Journal says: Captain W. C. McNaught, marine surveyor, who was brought home injured from Bandon, Saturday night, will likely be operated upon today at Good Samaritan hospital. His injury consists of a compound fracture of the left leg below the knee and the cast placed at Coos Bay Thursday is to be removed and a new cast placed here. Captain McNaught will likely be in the hospital for a number of weeks.
