**Is a Candidate.**—W. H. Bunch accompanied by his two sons was in the city today. Mr. Bunch is a candidate for the republican nomination

**Some at Beach.**—There were a number of auto parties at Sunset Bay yesterday but the season is a little early yet and the crowd was not as great as the usual summer season.

**Walking on Crutches.**—County Commissioner W. T. Dement arrived here this morning from Myrtle Point, walking on crutches. He has been laid up with a broken leg for the past two months.

**Many Go on Train.**—Many went out from Marshfield and North Bend on the morning train Sunday for visits to North Lake and Reedsport. Two extra coaches were added to the train at Marshfield.

**Cut Off From the World.**—This morning was received from Frank B. Tichenor, of Port Orford, a letter stating that not in five days has the paper mail come through to the residents of that vicinity. "People here are getting disgusted," he writes.

**Takes Up His Duties.**—William Cox today took up his new duties as assistant engineer of the Marshfield Fire Department, taking the place of Duncan Ferguson, Jr., who has resigned to go back into the transfer business with his father.

**Receives Diploma.**—D. A. Curry, has received a diploma from California showing that he has passed the examination of the state required of a chiropodist. He took the examination here last October. D. A. Curry is a chiropodist of this city.

**Left Today.**—Judge Coke left on train for Toledo, near Newport, where he will hold a session of the circuit court for a week or two, taking the place of Judge Skipworth who is busy elsewhere. Judge Coke may return later and hear some of the cases in session at Coquille in which he is not disqualified.

**Says Coos Is Good.**—Carl D. Shoemaker, state fish and game warden is quoted as follows in a Portland newspaper: "Coos Bay is destined to be Oregon's real sportsmen's paradise. The many streams and lakes are full of trout. The forests are full of game and they are not always to be so unless they are conserved."

**Turns Over Stand.**—Today Charles Van Duyn formerly of the Chandler Hotel, turned over the cigar counter and news stand in the Chandler to Manager Harry J. McKeown. Mr. Van Duyn has had a lease on this business, but is now leaving here and expects to settle either in Portland or Tillamook.

**Tear Out Fronts.**—Workmen were busy today tearing out the glass fronts of Anicker's Confectionery and the Owl Drug store. This was for the purpose of extending the fronts out a distance of about 18 inches, thus giving more room inside the stores and bringing them out flush with the inside edge of the sidewalk and the property line.

**Returns to Rosburg.**—W. A. Pettit, news editor of the Rosburg Review, who has been here for the past week, being called as a witness in the Treadgold damage case, returned home Sunday morning. Mr. Pettit is well known here as he has visited in the city a number of times and is one of the best known newspaper men in Southwestern Oregon.

**Ship Rhododendrons.**—Some of the people of Coos Bay lately have been picking rhododendrons especially those in the bud, to ship to other parts of the state or even to the east. It is said the best way is to wrap them well in wet moss and also to paraffine the ends of the stems. In this way they should keep for several days.

**Engine Put in Place.**—A large donkey engine was brought up and put in place this morning for the driving of piling for the foundation to the Going and Harvey building to be started at the corner of Anderson and Broadway. The engine is mounted on skid and was brought from the depot by means of a cable anchored to various stakes. By turning the cable drum the engine sledged over the ground.

**Council to Meet.**—At eight o'clock this evening the city fathers will meet to transact the business of the city. Among the important measures coming up for discussion are the dog ordinance and the adoption of a grade for Central avenue. There has been considerable comment raised on the proposed ordinance to keep all dogs shut up or on a leash. Many owners are protesting that this is unfair, inasmuch as they pay their dog licenses.

**Bean Bake Tonight.**—The Sons of Veterans will hold their regular monthly meeting this evening in the Owl's Hall on North Front street. There is to be a regulation army bean bake and the members will invite seven or eight men into the order. At the same time the membership rolls for the militia, either the coast artillery or the naval company, will be opened and as many names as possible will be put on the list, from which the examining officer, expected here later, could make a selection. The list will later be placed where everyone may have a chance to enter his name.

**Long Answers Filed.**—City Attorney J. T. Brand for the city, and C. R. Peck, for the Port of Coos Bay have each filed answers 75 pages in length in the case of C. A. Johnson versus the Port and the City for \$30,000, claiming this much damages for the alleged flooding of lands above the Mill Slough fill. To this the plaintiff, through his attorneys, Stoll and Hodge, has demurred. The attorneys went to Coquille this morning, though they hardly believed their case would get before Judge Hamilton today.
