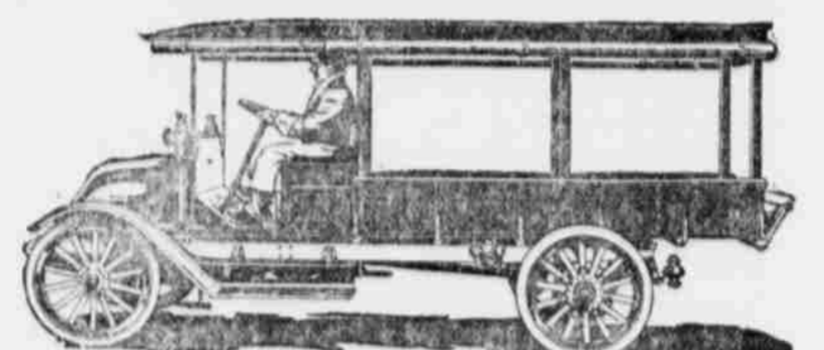
F. B. TICHENOR DEFINES HIS STAND ON FISHING
