Makes Reference to J. T. Harrison and Archie Phillips Who Seek Republican Nomination

The following communication has been received by The Times:
Marshfield, Oregon, May 4th.
Editor, Coos Bay Times:

I have noted with considerable amusement, and I might also say chagrin, the announcement of the candidacy of one Archie Phillips, for the Republican nomination for County Commissioner. The amusing feature of this announcement is the apparent solicitude of Mr. Phillips in the welfare of the taxpayers of Coos county, although to the best of my knowledge he has not contributed to its support as a taxpayer. My chagrin is due to the fact that we as taxpayers, are obliged to choose between one who is not financially interested in the county and one who has invested a large amount of money here and who is vitally interested in a business-like management of county affairs.

I am not personally acquainted with either of the candidates, but as a taxpayer of this county I am naturally interested in the judicious expenditure of county funds, and believe this can only be done by electing a man for the commissionership who has made a success of his own business and who would therefore be qualified to give us a business-like administration. The KITCHEN CUPBOARD

ORANGE VARIATIONS.
ORANGE SALAD.—Cut off the tops of large oranges. Carefully remove pulp. Mix pulp with an equal quantity of sliced bananas and one-half the quantity of walnut meats. Marinate with French dressing. Place in orange shells. Chill thoroughly and serve with toasted crackers.
Orange Delight.—Soak half a box of gelatin in one quart of cold water fifteen minutes; now add three quarts of boiling water, stir until dissolved, put into it half a pint of granulated sugar, three quarts of sour orange juice and the strained juice of one lemon. Stand in a cool place. Harden in the refrigerator. Place a couple of rounds of sliced orange in each individual dish, cover with the jelly, then a layer of soft custard or whipped cream as a mask. Serve cold with lady fingers.
Orange Jello.—Put one running over tablespoonful of strained orange juice in a bowl, one teaspoonful of lemon juice and one teaspoonful of sherry wine or brandy, with the grated yellow rind of one small sour orange; let it stand for twenty minutes; then stir in half a teaspoonful of confectioner's sugar, then the slightly beaten yolk of one egg and stir. Now add sufficient confectioner's sugar to make it the consistency to spread easily over the cake. It should not run. Spread evenly, then put in a cool, dry place to stiffen.
Orange Fudding.—Take two eggs, two-thirds of a cupful of sugar, grated rind and juice of one large orange, one pint of milk, one tablespoonful of butter and four tablespoonful of bread-crumbs. Beat the eggs until light and add sugar and orange juice. Scald milk and add butter and pour over the crumbs and add to the eggs, sugar and orange juice. Mix well, bake slowly and serve very cold.
