FIRE OPENING SHOT

GOOD ROADS SPEAKING CAMPAIGN OPENS TOMORROW

North Bend To Get First "Jolt"—Frank Terrace, John Yeon and Rufus Holman, Speaking

In North Bend tomorrow evening will be fired the opening gun in the whirlwind good roads campaign in Coos county for the purpose of centering interest on the \$362,000 special road bonds which May 19 will come before the voters.

Frank Terrace, farmer of King county, Wash., and one of the most ardent good roads boosters in the Northwest, will be the principal speaker. With him will be Charles Hall, president of the Coos Good Roads Association, Judge James Watson and several other speakers. Terrace used to live on a country road in Washington, a highway so sloppy that travel in the winter was practically an impossibility. He learned his lesson and ever since has been a firm advocate of good roads. On Friday John Yeon, Multnomah county roadmaster, and Rufus C. Holman are expected here to speak through the county.
