C. F. Greve, the shoe dealer, who has been ill for several months, is slowly improving and is able to be about some.

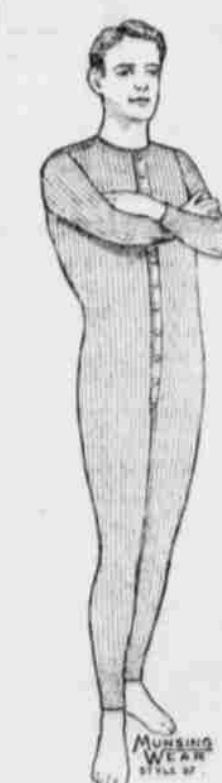
Through With Coos Bay.—The Folk directory people have practically finished the canvass of North Bend and Marshfield and are now working over in the Coquille Valley.
