GIVES HIS REASONS HAVE NEW RULE ATTENDANCE LARGE

L. A. LILJEQVIST SEEKS RETURN AS DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Explains Why He Is Entitled to be Nominated—No Apologies to Make

There is not a newspaper in the county that will not approve fully of the following statements made by L. A. Liljeqvist in the Harbor: To the Republican Voters:

1.—I have had eight years' experience in the office and am thoroughly familiar with the legal phases of state and county work.

2.—A district attorney is not a prosecutor alone. He must solve the legal problems arising out of county business and is the adviser of county officers.

3.—I have specialized along these lines. Court work has put that specialization to the test. The records show whether or not this work has been successful.

4.—The county is involved in complicated tax litigation involving several hundreds of thousands of dollars. During the year 1916 this litigation will involve nearly \$500,000. The Southern Oregon company has maintained in the circuit court of Coos county, the supreme court of Oregon, the supreme court of the United States and the United States district court, litigation since July 1912 involving taxation of its grant lands. Coos county has won every fight up to date.

The Kinney Case
The Kinney receivership has restrained the county from foreclosing its liens, but the court has now entered an order giving the county the right to prosecute its tax liens to final decree. The Southern Oregon company, Kinney tax matters and all 1909 delinquent taxes are now pending by a suit in court which will cover the lands delinquent for the year 1909 and prior years and all taxes due on the delinquent taxes of 1909. NAVAL MILITIA LAWS ARE DIFFERENT NOW

More Inducement Offered Than Before—May Have Aeroplane Squadron and Vessel Here

To those who contemplate enlisting in the naval militia it will be interesting to know the rules and regulations governing the naval militia of this state have been entirely changed in the last two years so that there is a material difference between the organizations of the naval militia as formerly constituted on Coos Bay and the organization about to be formed. The naval militia is more directly under the control of the United States naval officers, and there is an officer of the navy with each division for the purpose of instruction; and there will be an officer assigned here as soon as the organization is formed.

There will be a bill passed by this congress which provides that all members of the naval militia shall receive 25 per cent of the pay of members of the United States navy. That means that each member of the local division will receive at least \$4.75 a month and if he cares to study, can receive as high as \$35 a month.

Service Required
The time required for service of the members is one drill per week of one and one-half hours duration, though the members of this division will necessarily have to drill more than that at first to get in condition to take the cruise to Alaska. The members of the division are assigned to different sections of the organization.

May Have Flying Machine
It is intended to make every effort possible to secure the location of a flying machine section, and in order to do this it is necessary we have men who are willing to study and fit themselves for this work. The men being enlisted and assigned to different sections are not transferred to other sections.

May Secure a Boat
It is assured by the Adj. General that we will be able to secure the assignment of a torpedo boat for Coos Bay, and when that is done it will be necessary, of course, to enlist an engineers division to act as firemen and engineers. There are also openings for blacksmiths, plumbers, carpenters and electricians in the work aboard ship for which they are fitted by their trades. The possibilities of advancement are unlimited.

There will be a cruise of all the ships of the Pacific division of the United States Navy, together with the naval militia of California, Washington and Oregon to Alaska and return, beginning July 15th and returning July 29th.

Must Apply Soon
There can be no applications received after Saturday, May 13th, as there will undoubtedly be more applications than there are vacancies; so that it is necessary to make your application at once at the Chamber of Commerce to the secretary any day or evening, either at Marshfield, or North Bend.

subsequent years and as soon as he files these the other suits will be brought. Judge G. F. Skipworth announces that he will come to Coos county the last of June or first of July to hear and dispose of all pending tax litigation.

Question Never Tested
These new tax laws have never been construed by our supreme court, proceedings are required for which no precedents exist in Oregon. This litigation requires skill, experience and ability. I have spent three years in making an exhaustive study of this new law and procedure and in perfecting the forms, completing it with a study of the Washington system on the ground. Our tax foreclosure law was borrowed from Washington. I believe my knowledge on this subject is valuable to the taxpayer.

5.—During the last eight years Coos county has never had any problems, civil or criminal which have been too big to be borne by the district attorney's office and has not paid out a dollar for special counsel fees. At different times a ten dollar fee has been paid to a private attorney for some justice case or default divorce case where I have been engaged elsewhere or out of the county. That is all.

6.—During the last eight years, Coos county's criminal business has equalled the entire criminal business from 1854 to 1908 according to the county clerk's criminal docket. Crimes have ranged from the most petty to the most desperate.

7.—I have prosecuted 286 persons. Of this number only 17 have escaped by acquittal by juries or discharge by the court or prosecutor. Four of these were appeals from small justice cases, two being lost cases. Hundreds of cases have been investigated which the public never heard of.

No Nonsuits Obtained
Neither the state nor Coos county has ever been nonsuited; no case has ever been taken from the jury upon a complaint or indictment signed by me. I have written the briefs and prepared the appeals to the supreme court in 23 civil and criminal cases. Eighteen of them were won on appeal. Of the other five, two were lost cases; in one the law was held invalid, two were set back for new trials. One was settled and in the other case the defendant was convicted again.

The Position Assumed
Where grand juries have indicted, I have prosecuted vigorously.

Damage to Fruit Reaches Millions
Many Localities on the Pacific Coast Suffered Because of the Cold Weather

Millions of dollars damage has been done fruit crops along the Pacific coast during the last ten days by the unseasonable cold weather, and in some sections reports indicate that production will be nominal.

The fog helped the upper Rogue river country and some of the large orchardists in other localities saved their crops with smudges.

Locally there was some damage but how extensive it was has not yet been reported.

TELLS OF BOND ISSUE
J. W. Bennett Gives Reason for Not Bidding at Umpqua

Regarding the Port of Umpqua bonds, J. W. Bennett said that the reason the Flanagan & Bennett Bank didn't have a bid in for these bonds was that their Eastern connections didn't consider them attractive investments for the reason that there was not enough income-bearing improvements and manufactures within the district to make it as attractive as such bonds as the Port of Coos Bay, and for that reason they instructed Flanagan & Bennett Bank not to bid.
