MARTHUR NAMED

He Is Given A Very Close Race for Congress by Lafferty

OLCOTT IS NOMINATED

Congressmen Hawley and Sinnott Are Both Returned by the Republicans - Very Few Votes Are Cast for Roosevelt

PORTLAND, May 20.—Complete and incomplete returns from every county in Oregon show that the republican primary election yesterday gave Hughes a substantial majority in the preference vote for the nomination for president. Cummins is second, Burton third.

President Wilson was unopposed by the Democratic party. The Progressives who cast a very light vote, favored Roosevelt.

McArthur Is Named

Congressman McArthur appears re-nominated by the Republicans of the Third District although Former Congressman Lafferty gave him a close race.

Olcott Wins Out

Congressmen Hawley and Sinnott, republican incumbents in the First and Third Districts, were re-nominated without opposition. Ben W. Olcott, republican secretary of state, was re-nominated over C. B. Moores by a large majority.

Buchtel Is Ahead

Fred G. Buchtel nominated over K. Campbell for public service commissioner of Western Oregon. Eastern Oregon the race is undecided.

VOTING IS LIGHT

Only About Half of Number of Votes Cast in Wet and Dry Election of 1914

Marshfield cast only half as many votes yesterday as she did a year ago. The total of the six precincts, making the sum of votes on the road bonds, was 793 against 1575 cast in the wet and dry election of 1914. It was expected the vote this time would at least come close to 1,200.

About one third of the total vote yesterday was by the women, as close as this can be approximated.

Of the 793 votes cast in the election, about 145 of these number were Democrats and three were Progressives, with the remainder Republicans.

POLITICIAN DIES

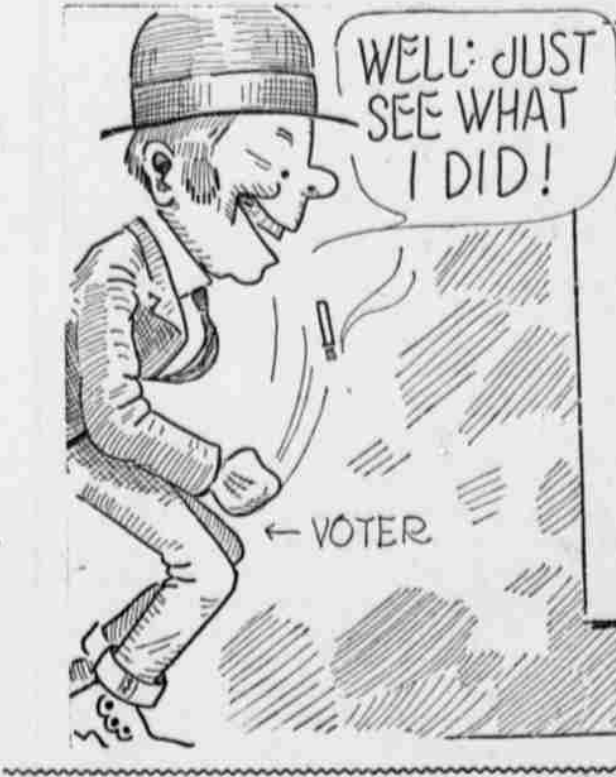

Twelve States Have Sent Word That They Would Take Part

CHICAGO, May 20.—Animal mascots will form a unique part of the woman's suffrage parade here June 7, it was announced today. Twelve states have already sent word to the parade headquarters that they will be accompanied by animals.

The California suffragists started the move by procuring a tame grizzly. Illinois followed by adopting the elephant, Wyoming, the buffalo; Colorado, the mountain goat; Utah, the porcupine; Idaho, the black bear; Oregon the cinnamon bear; Washington the eagle; Arizona the Lizard; Kansas the Pig; Montana, the mountain lion, and Nevada the Mustang.

GERMANS ARE FIGHTING HARD

New Offensive on the Western Front Has Broadened And New Points Taken

AIRSHIPS ATTACK

Bombs are Dropped On Several Cities and a Number of Persons Killed

FIVE DEAD AT DUNKIRK

French and Belgians Return the Attack by Dropping Bombs on a German Camp—French Positions are Heavily Bombarded

LONDON, May 20.—The German offensive on the western front suddenly broadened. Yesterday's attacks gained several new points. The Germans took the offensive along the Yser canal between Steenstraete and Het Sas last night.

Paris says the German attempt to cross the canal failed. The Teutons attacked in Champagne.

Paris states suffragiating gas was used but the attack was repulsed.

Airships Bombard

Dunkirk was bombarded by German aeroplanes. One woman was killed, 27 persons were injured.

Bergen, near Dunkirk, was also bombarded by German aeroplanes. Five persons were killed and 11 wounded.

French and Belgian aeroplanes dropped bombs on the German camp. On the Verdun front there are no important developments. The French positions at Avoourt and Adam's were bombarded violently.

RAPS REPUBLICANS

SALISBURY, N. C., May 20.—President Wilson, addressing a large crowd at the railroad station here today as he passed through on the way to Charlotte, attacked the leaders of the republican party as men who are "looking backward." Members of the president's party declared he was referring to the fight led by Senator Gallinger, defeating the nomination of George Rublee to the federal trade commission. "There are some men—I do not believe they represent the great rank and file of the republican party, but men who now control the republican party—two are looking backward, not forward. They do not know the problem of the new day, and whenever I, for example, try to show my sympathies for forward looking men of their own party by nominating men of that sort, they at once try to block progress."

SHIP BILL PASSED

GOES THROUGH HOUSE IN VIRTUALLY ORIGINAL FORM

Designed to Aid Upbuilding of Merchant Marine and Strengthen American Navy

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 20.—The administration shipping bill, designed to upbuild the merchant marine and strengthen the navy, passed the house today 211 to 161, virtually in the form in which it was introduced.

MAKES AIR RECORD

VICTOR CARLSTROM FLIES 410 MILES IN BIPLANE

Best Mark Set in U. S.—Did Distance in Four Hours One Minute at Newport News

POPE THANKED BY GERMANY

Kaiser Sends Word that He Appreciates the Well Meaning Effort

FACT MADE KNOWN

Sir Edward Grey Explains the Matter in the House of Commons Today

IS WILLING TO MEDIATE

Head of Catholic Church Offered to Try and Help Settle the Differences Between the U. S. and Germany

LONDON, May 20.—A Reuter dispatch from Amsterdam quotes the Berlin Norddeutsche Zeitung as asserting that the statement of Sir Edward Grey in the house of commons that the Vatican endeavored to induce Germany to abandon the submarine warfare was not in conformity with the facts.

The Norddeutsche Zeitung says: "We learn from a trustworthy source that the pope intimated to Germany and the United States his willingness to mediate the dispute between them. The emperor thanked the pope for his good intention and referred to the reply which Germany had already given America."

AIRCRAFT FELL

LONDON, May 20.—Three German seaplanes raided the English coast last night. They dropped 27 bombs, killing one soldier and wounding two civilians. One of the aircraft was brought down off the Belgian coast.

VOLCANOES ACTIVE

CHICAGO, May 20.—The government weather bureau here received a report today of the volcanic activity at Honolulu. "Mauna Loa is in eruption and Kilauea is unusually active" the message read.

Until recently tourists have been able to go down inside the crater of Mauna Loa which is one of the sights of the Hawaiian Islands.

HOUSE ADOPTS REPORT ON THE ARMY BILL

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 20.—By a vote of 349 to 25, the house today adopted the conference report on the army bill as previously adopted by the senate.

MUST HOLD IDEALS

CHARLOTTE, N. C., May 20.—President Wilson today addressed a crowd estimated at more than 100,000 persons gathered here for the 141st anniversary of the signing of Mecklenburg declaration of independence. He was introduced by Governor Craig who spoke of the president as one of the greatest leaders the nation has ever seen. The president spoke briefly and devoted himself almost wholly to a discussion of ideals of the United States. He declared "Untainted Americanism" was needed and the United States must preserve its ideals in order to be of assistance in helping the world. "This nation has devoted itself too much to material things" he said.
