MARSHFIELD HIGH SCHOOL TEAM WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

Take Total of 52 Points in Meet With Four Other Schools—Merchant High Point Winner

Marshfield again has won the Coos county track championship, garnering in a total of 52 points against 24 of Bandon, her nearest competitor, in the meet held at Myrtle Point on Saturday.

Two county records were established. Kramer, of Marshfield, pole vaulted 10 feet six inches. Bullards, of Bandon, ran the mile in 4:56 minutes.

Merchant, of Marshfield, was high point winner, taking 24 points. He won first in the following events, broadjump, 19.3 feet; in

the 50 yard dash, six seconds; 100 yard dash, 11 seconds; shot put, 38 feet plus; and also second in the javelin and third in the discus.

Kramer, also of this city, was second point winner with a total of 17. He won three firsts, pole vault 10 feet 6 inches; high jump, 5 feet; javelin, 134 feet and two third places, one of which was the broad jump.

In a track suit for the first time this year Wesley Seaman "copped" off seven points, taking second in the broad jump, the 220 and 3rd in the 100 yard dash.

Marshfield won the 880 yard relay. Those who ran in it were Bolt, Seaman, Frantz and Merchant. The following men from this city participated in the meet, Frantz, Seaman, Merchant, Back, Holt, Bonebrake, Kramer and McDonald.

The day was a good one and there was a fairly good sized crowd at the Myrtle Point Fair grounds.
