The herring run has begun and some parties near Yaquina City are now salting them in large quantities.

Parker's sawmill, down the bay, finished the contract for sawing timbers for the government work last week. The contract called for 80,000 feet.

Last Monday night some person broke into the country store of Wm. Enos and stole a few articles, none of them of very great value. No arrests have been made as yet, but suspicion is pointed to a certain party.

E. E. Davis, county recorder of Linn county, was in the city last Monday. He is connected with J. S. VanWinkle & Co., who have been awarded the contract for transcribing the Lincoln county records.

The county will have a brick vault 6x6 feet in the clear, erected in the courthouse for the purpose of storing the books and records of the county. This is very necessary as the county records are too valuable to run the risk of a fire.

The steam schooner Alice Blanchard, of Tacoma, loaded with wheat and coal was met with some very rough treatment in the storm of the first of the week and now lies on the sand spit in the bay at Newport, about opposite the Ocean House.

The schooner lost her rudder during the first of the storm, and was attempting to steer with steam when she shipped a heavy sea, putting out her fires and disabling her engines. She managed to make in over the bar yesterday by the use of sails, and when inside, drifted out onto the sand spit. They are unloading her today and will doubtless float her off, and save her. Among the many assessors of the state who gave their opinions through the Oregonian concerning the question of assessment of mortgages, T. E. Parker, assessor of Lincoln county says:

"There has been quite a diversity of opinions expressed by the different assessors throughout the state in regard to the assessment of mortgages. I think by repealing the mortgage tax law that mortgages will revert to personal property. It is very important that the assessors at the convention called to meet in Portland April 7 should establish a uniform grade of assessment on all personal property throughout the state, whereby each county would pay its just proportion of taxation into the state treasury, as we have never had an equal assessment on this class of property. There should also be a law making it the duty of assessors to hold a convention prior to March 1 of each year, so as to adopt such rules as they might find convenient to improve and expedite their work."

County Matters.

County court has been in session since last Monday, this being its first regular session. The business transacted up to the time of going to press is as follows:

Contract was made with J. S. VanWinkle & Co., of Albany, for the transcribing of the records from Benton to Lincoln county. The contract calls for the completion of the work in four months from the 4th day of April, 1893. The firm are under \$2,000 bonds to good and faithfully perform the work and the county pays \$4,300 for the job complete.

The sum of \$8 per month was allowed to Grose, at Chitwood, and the sum of \$16 per month was allowed Jas. Forrest and family, of Yaquina City.

In the matter of the petition of Jas Chitwood, L. T. Pepin, and others, for a bridge near the town of Chitwood. Action thereon was postponed till the regular June term.

The county clerk was ordered to turn the tax roll over to the sheriff for collection, said roll to be returned on June 4th.
