Wm. Alexander wishes us to inform the people that work on the Alsea road will be begun the first of next week. Parties who have subscribed work thereon will govern themselves accordingly.

Toledo's depot deposit was in Hamilton & Job's bank at Corvallis. It was first deposited at the First National but this was not satisfactory to the company and it was withdrawn and placed with Hamilton, Job & Co.

Chas. Dick says that his hens won't lay big eggs but he brought us a gooseberry the other day that measured 2 1/2 x 2 1/2 inches on its circumference, and it was fat on it yet which shows that it was not done growing.

T. P. Bryant, an old resident on the Bay, left for Huntington, Oregon, last Tuesday where he will make a stay of some months. He visits his brother at that place, whom he has not seen for thirty-nine years.

It is generally conceded and understood that Toledo will have no celebration on the 4th of July this year, but will help Newport to celebrate that glorious day. Next year Toledo can celebrate and Newport can reciprocate.

A monster road petition was presented to the county court this week asking for the opening of the road leading down to deep water which has been in question lately. Action was deferred upon the petition till July.

A spell of sunshine would help gardens amazingly.

We acknowledge a short call from Mr. Foster, of Chitwood today. After so long a time strawberries have made their appearance on the market.

Will Rich took charge of the postoffice last Sunday and is now a full pledged postmaster.

Rev. Booth will hold services at the church here next Sunday at the usual morning hour and at Mill Four in the afternoon.

A Mr. Barton, a brother-in-law of E. Rhoades, of this place, came over from Jefferson the first of the week and will stop a while on the Bay.

A familiar land mark has been removed at Elk City, by the tearing down of the old warehouse built by the Military Wagon road company twenty-seven years ago.

Mrs. C. G. Copeland has received a large invoice of new goods this week and when in shape her stock will offer the best chance for selections, both in style and prices, of any in Lincoln county.

E. M. Mays, the postmaster and merchant of Elk City has gone to the Rural Health Resort, at St. Helena, California, with the hopes of recuperating his rapidly failing health.

The Oregon Pacific company will run an excursion train from Albany to Yaquina, on Saturday, June 17, returning Sunday evening. Tickets will be sold at popular prices. Similar excursions will be continued during the summer.

A petition will be presented to the county court on July 5th asking the court to call an election to vote upon incorporation. The boundaries of the proposed incorporation are described in the notice published in another column.

There was \$18,000 of the State's money locked in Hamilton, Job & Co's bank when it failed to open its doors last Saturday morning. Gov. Penoyer was over to see about it yesterday. The money had been placed to the credit of the building fund of the Agricultural college.

A semi-official statement is made by the bursted bank officials that 75 per cent. of the deposits will be paid in about sixty days. The fulfillment of this prediction is earnestly hoped for by many of the mournful depositors at this end of the line.

Three of the fattest Federal plums in Oregon have been shaken from the administration tree and have been distributed as follows: D. R. Murphy, U. S. District Attorney; Henry C. Grady, U. S. marshal for Oregon; and J. T. Black, collector of the Willamette district.

D. F. Scott is getting quite a reputation as a sturgeon fisher. Since a week ago last Monday he has caught twenty-two sturgeon averaging about fifty pounds each, or about 1,100 pounds of fish. The largest he has caught weighed 150 pounds and the smallest about twenty pounds.

D. C. Rosebrooks returned from Chicago yesterday, where he had been engaged in the orchestra of a minstrel troupe. He returned by the way of California, and thus was longer enroute than if he had come by the Northern Pacific. His delay in reaching here caused his parents considerable anxiety.

Again Extended.

Word comes from Corvallis that Judge Fullerton again extended the time of sale of the Oregon Pacific railroad from June 28th to October 28th, four months. The extension was made at the instance of the Blair faction, and the reason assigned is that there is no probability of a bidder appearing on the 28th, owing to the depressed condition of the financial world.

Receiver's Report For April.

The first month of Receiver Hadley's administration showed a net gain from the operation of the Oregon Pacific of \$77,000. His report for April, filed with the clerk of the court on the 27th of May, makes a still better showing. The figures are as follows: Gross receipts from river, ocean and rail divisions, \$21,332.69. Gross expenses, \$20,940. Divided as follows: Rail, \$10,747.53; River, \$5,350.47; Ocean, \$4,642.66. Net gain, \$392.56. Owing to the fact that April is one of the dullest months of the year in the transportation business, the showing is to be regarded as very favorable to the property and its management.—Times.

County Court Proceedings.

(Continued from last week.)

Now comes Fred Greenbrook and petitions the Court for the establishment of a public road thirty feet in width from the petitioner's residence to the county road at or near the center of section 4, town 11, range 11. The said petitioner having filed a good and sufficient bond to indemnify the county against any loss which may be incurred in the proceedings, now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that John Logan, Earl Anderson and E. Rhoades, be and are hereby appointed viewers to meet at the house of the said Fred Greenbrook on Monday, the 19, day of June, at 8 o'clock a. m., and proceed to view and locate said road and assess all damages which may occur by the opening of said report thereof to this court at its next regular session.

In the matter of appointment of a justice of peace for Yaquina precinct; Ordered that Allen Parker be and is hereby appointed as justice of the peace in and for said precinct to fill the unexpired portion of the term caused by the resignation of Thomas Russell, and until his successor in office be duly elected and qualified.

In the matter of petition of W. N. White et al. for opening of and removal of obstructions from road beginning near the mouth of Depot slough running thence to intersect a road running from Pioneer to Yaquina; Held; that it has not been made satisfactorily to appear to the court that the definite location of said road can be established, wherefore action thereon is continued for submission of further proof in relation thereto.

The plan seems to be a good one, and is similar to the one proposed by Judge Blue when it was seen that these difficulties were going to rise between the two counties. Neither county can afford an expensive lawsuit when the winner loses more than he gains. As far as the claims of Lincoln county are concerned we are quite sure that our people are willing to submit them to arbitration by disinterested parties at any time.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that the following petition will be presented to the County Court of Lincoln County, Oregon, at its regular term, on July 5th, 1893, viz:

PETITION.
To the Honorable County Court of Lincoln County, State of Oregon:
We, the undersigned electors of Lincoln County, residents in the limits of the hereinafter described corporation, would represent that the Town of Toledo, in said Lincoln County, contains three hundred inhabitants, and respectfully ask that the town of Toledo be incorporated under the general laws of Oregon applying to towns and villages, said corporation to be known by the name and style of the City of Toledo, and bounded as follows, to-wit:
Commencing at the northeast corner of Benton & Williams' addition to the town of Toledo, Lincoln County, Oregon, running thence south to a point 1,500 feet north from the northwest corner of the southwest 1/4 of the southeast 1/4 of section 17, town 11 south, range 10 west, thence east to center of Olalla Slough, thence down the center of said slough to O. P. R. R. right-of-way, thence westerly along north line of said right-of-way to a point sixty feet south of the line between land claims of John Graham and A. W. Vincent; thence west to center of Olalla Slough; thence up center of said slough to intersection of section line between sections 17 and 18; thence north on said section line to north line of Thirteenth street; thence east on said line of street to T. P. Fish's addition; thence due north to northeast corner of Russell & Williams' addition; thence due east to place of beginning.

We, your petitioners, would respectfully ask your honorable body to grant our petition, and incorporate Toledo under the general laws of Oregon, believing it to be for the general good and prosperity of our town.
