In the published financial exhibit of Benton county on July 1, 1893, appears the item: "In Hamilton, Job & Co's bank, \$11,057.86." The indications are that it will stay there a while, too.

W. I. Christy, of Yaquina, has leased the Tom Buttler place for two years, and will soon move on to it. Mr. Buttler will soon leave for Klamath county where he will make his future home.

A sample of volunteer oats from Clark Copeland's place in this city was brought into this office last Saturday. One stalk measured six feet and three inches in height and had 140 well formed grains in the head.

We would call the attention of our small fruit growers to the fact that the local market of Toledo has never been supplied yet this year with currants, gooseberries or strawberries, and we doubt if it will be with currants or gooseberries.

The mandamus suit against the superintendent of Benton county came up for hearing on Tuesday. A motion to define more particularly the capacity of Mr. Booth, the party bringing the suit was overruled, and thereupon the defense filed a demurrer to the complaint. The court set the time for hearing the demurrer on August 31st. No other matters in which Lincoln county is interested came up for hearing.

The differences arising over the tax question between the two counties are becoming in better shape and are now in a fair way of amicable adjustment. Benton county will turn over to Lincoln county all the 1892 taxes collected upon Lincoln county property, but does not yet agree to surrender Lincoln county's just proportion of delinquent taxes. It is quite probable, however, that this will also be adjusted fairly.

L. C. Powell, a resident of Beaver creek, near Ona postoffice, was a caller of this office yesterday. Mr. Powell is a surveyor, and is also the owner of considerable land on Beaver creek. He is erecting a small saw mill on that creek, with which he expects to saw enough lumber to supply the local needs. He purchased the planer of the old Vincent mill at this place and will move it over. He will also have a shingle attachment in his mill and will make shingles. The mill will no doubt fill an urgent want felt by the settlers on Beaver, and we commend Mr. Powell for his enterprise.

Saturday night two hand cars of employees, of the Oregon Pacific, were running from Albany to Corvallis. On the way Thomas Smith, who was pumping on the front of the first car, lost his balance and fell off under the wheels. Both cars run over him and he was picked up dying. The deceased was a young man who only recently came from the East, and had only been working for the O. P. a short time.

Irwin Smith, a young farmer of Benton county, advertised in an eastern paper for a wife. It resulted in an engagement with Millie E. Little, of Kansas. Monday the young lady arrived at Corvallis and was met at the depot by the young man. They immediately secured a license and were married. They had arranged a code of signals for the purpose of mutual recognition, which worked like a charm.

Of what is known as the five per cent. road fund coming to the various counties, there is due Lincoln county the sum of \$632.85. County Treasurer Denlinger recently wrote to the state treasurer concerning the matter and received in reply a newspaper clipping giving the amounts due the various counties, with an explanatory note at the bottom which stated that warrants for the amount due each county had been forwarded to each county that had paid its state tax, but that there would be no hurry to pay those that had not yet paid such tax. Inasmuch as Lincoln county does not owe the state any tax, it would seem that the warrant for its share should have been received some time ago. We would suggest that the state treasurer make arrangements to answer correspondence in a somewhat more definite manner than by a newspaper clipping.
