He was hanging on the steps at the end of the car when he struck against the frame-work of the bridge. He was knocked senseless and was seriously bruised about the head and back. He was brought to Toledo and taken to the Hotel Lincoln where he was attended to by Dr. Rich, and is in fair way to recover.

C. C. Hogue was in the city last night. He brought a deed from T. Egerton Hogg to Wm. M. Hoag wherein the Col. transfers all the Yaquina docks, wharf, right-of-way and all terminal property that remained in his name or that he was in any way interested. The instrument was a voluminous document, covering about nine pages of closely printed type-written manuscript in the description alone. The consideration named in the deed is \$5,000. It is evident that Col. Hogg wishes to get the title of his Yaquina property out of his hands, for reasons best known to himself.

There has been a report circulated that the outstanding indebtedness of Lincoln county exceeded \$15,000. This statement originated in one of the papers of our own county, and is false and malicious; malicious inasmuch as the party that started it had access to the county records which would have proven to him beyond doubt that his statement was a libel on the county. We are preparing a complete statement of the financial condition of the county on the first of January, and expected to have it in time for this week but have been prevented from getting access to certain books and records in time. When this statement appears, which will be next week, our maligners will see wherein they have wilfully misrepresented facts, and our citizens generally will see that our finances are not in bad shape at all.
