O. R. Altree was up from Newport yesterday.

The weather of the past week has been much and varied.

A representative of Ben C. Irwin & Co., of Portland, was in town last Friday.

The expected run of steel head salmon has not materialized in the Yaquina bay this winter, as yet.

Oscar Taylor got a nice wood shed completed just in time to get it blown down by the recent high wind.

The appointment of Jas. Gaither as chief clerk at the agency has been confirmed by the Indian department.

The new bell for the St. John's church of this place is expected in on the incoming steamer, and will soon be in place.

The latest canvas of the grand, dates for the office of county judge showed seven in the field, and the back precincts to hear from.

Herman Wulf, a brother of Henry Wulf, of this city, arrived here from Germany last Friday, and will make his home here.

Concerning the recent fire at Woodburn, a Salem paper gravely remarks: "Ugly rumors are afloat though nothing is suspected by the public."

The election notices for the June election have been printed this week and they will soon be posted by the sheriff in the various precincts.

A land slide at Oysterville Friday night delayed Saturday morning's train about six hours. The slide was about five feet deep and forty feet wide.

News item in the Corvallis Times: "The Times is the nearest, liveliest and best paper published in Benton or Lincoln counties." Glad some one found it out and told the people about it, even if it was the editor of the Times.

We are patiently awaiting the filing of the report of ex-receiver Hadley, showing what was done with the last three months earnings of the road before Hadley stepped down and out.

The Odd Fellows lodge at this place were to initiate officers for the term last Friday night, but the storm prevented the installing officer to come up from Newport. They will probably install next Friday night.

This vicinity was visited by a high wind and heavy rains last Friday night. The storm continued until Sunday night with varying intensity. The telegraph line was blown down in several places and fences generally shaken up. We have heard of no serious damage, however.

That the coal interests of the Bay will now be developed there is not the remotest doubt. The success of the tunnel on the Shaw place has set all doubts aside on that question. The company that have been making the prospect have ample capital to develop the mine and the only thing they wished was ample assurance that the coal was there in paying quantities. Of this they are now assured, and we predict that the mine will be rapidly developed.

Two of Newport's enterprising young men are rigging up a boat to hunt seals off the coast.

Prof. Lambert will preach at the old school house in this place on the 4th Sunday of this month at 11 a. m. All are invited to attend.

T. C. Jackson, of the Siletz, was a caller yesterday. Mr. Jackson is a photographer by profession and has a gallery at the agency.

A country that has resources of coal, timber, fish, stock and fruit raising is one of the best countries on earth for the home builder. The Yaquina Bay country just fills the bill.

The Odd Fellows' new building of Newport lodge, which is located at Olssonville, is fairly under way. The piling for the foundation has been put in, some of which were driven down sixteen feet, but the boys say that they are going to have a good job of it.

The Oregon Pacific employees have secured the services of the law firm of D'Arcy & Bingham, of Salem, to look after their labor claims against the road. They give the attorneys ten per cent. of all cash obtained for the employees by them. The firm of D'Arcy & Bingham are said to be one of the best railroad law firms in the state.

We understand that R. E. Mulcahy is getting thoroughly tired of being made the scapegoat of the Hadley O. P. regime, and declares that unless it is saved shortly off that he will do some interesting talking himself. Under the circumstances we predict that it will be stopped off with a sudden shortness. It would make mighty interesting reading if Mulcahy should go to talking out of school.

The steamer Del Norte has been chartered by the Oregon Pacific Company to run temporarily on the Yaquina-San Francisco route, and will take the place of the Willamette for the present, at least. She is a 600 ton steamer and can be operated at much less expense than the Willamette. She sailed from San Francisco Tuesday for Yaquina with a full cargo of freight and passengers. She will continue to make trips about every eight days.

The company engaged in prospecting for coal on the Shaw, or Meggison place, have struck the old 1882 vein. The vein was at the end of a tunnel nearly 200 feet in the mountains and the vein is full three feet thick. The coal is of excellent quality and the company are now placing coal on the dump preparatory to supplying the local market for next season. This mine is located just a mile and a half due west of Toledo by section lines.

We received a letter from Eddyville this week which purported to have been written by an individual by the name of Peter Swackhammer. The letter dived into personal politics and was an attempt of a person not named Swackhammer to "even up" on politics and be smart at the same time. We simply mention it in order that the individual, whose identity is not so much of a secret as he imagines, may know that bait for suckers is not always eagerly taken.

If the dueling code was yet in vogue we would certainly send a challenge to Senator John H. Mitchell, at Washington; and for two reasons as follows: He hurt our feelings by insinuations, and then the distance he is from us would make it perfectly safe. It will be remembered that about a month ago grandma Matthews got to "chewing the rag" and while walking over our helpless corpse violently hinted that we would be a more glittering success at gardening; vegetables than gardening news; and now comes Senator Mitchell and adds insult to injury by sending us a nice package of assorted garden seeds through the mail. The insinuation is too much for us to bear. And then there was not quite enough of the beans, or corn, or peas to make a mess, so there were absolutely no extenuating circumstances. Now if the Senator will drop a year's subscription of \$1.50 in the slot so that we can hire a man to plant the seed we will consider the apology sufficient, otherwise it will take a red-blood to soothe our wounded dignity.

Blufe Miller returned to day from Oswego, where he has been working through the summer and fall.

The state tax levy has been made and placed at 4.3 mills. This makes the total levy for Lincoln county only \$9.3 mills, as against 22 mills last year.

While the Corvallis papers are making statements concerning the financial condition of Lincoln county they might publish a statement of their own county. They failed to do as the law provided, last October, Benton county is over two years behind in payment of warrants, and hence must be at least \$50,000 behind in outstanding warrants, to say nothing of the remainder of the debt incurred for the court house.

The following item has been handed to us: In the early days of Oregon two white men were on a trip up the coast from Humboldt bay in a small boat looking for some place to start a saw mill in some fine timber land. Having heard of the Siletz River, they thought they would explore this part of the coast, and make a landing at any place that they could get ashore. While drifting along one fine day they sighted a canoe with a lone Indian in it. They saw him go for the shore in a place where it looked impossible for a boat to land. Being good boatmen and thinking that there might be a harbor behind the cliff of rocks, they followed him to the shore. Upon landing the Indian was not to be seen but on the shore was some baskets filled with sand and gravel. When they stooped down, to examine the contents they were stopped by a voice in broken English commanding them from behind a large rock to come no further on penalty of their lives, and to go and return no more. As the Indian had the drop on them they thought that it would be best to go. Now what do you suppose was in those baskets? Unwashed gold. Some time ago one of the same men told of his trip and described the place and a party that is familiar with the coast says the description given locates it about 16 miles from Newport. A couple of men have gone to look for it and if located it will make quite a stir in the spring.
