The republicans of Toledo and vicinity met at the court house last night to take steps toward organizing a Young Men's republican club. F. D. Carson was elected temporary chairman and M. E. Peairs, secretary. Upon motion it was decided not to organize until a week from Saturday night. A committee on constitution and by-laws was appointed, composed of Geo. Bethers, Robt. Campbell and T. Jay Buford. Messrs. Dudley Perkins, A. O. Krogstad and Dr. H. W. Vincent, were appointed as a committee on speaking and music. After the preliminary business was done several short speeches were made by prominent local republicans, after which the meeting adjourned till Saturday evening April 7, at 7 o'clock.

The honor of being the oldest inhabitant of Lincoln county is claimed by John A. Olsson, of Newport. He landed at Oyster-ville in the early part of 1864 and has been a resident of the Bay county ever since.

J. Wm. Will, the well known music dealer of Corvallis, died at a health resort in California last week, of consumption. The remains were brought to Corvallis and interred in the Odd Fellows' cemetery on Thursday last.

A marriage license was issued Wednesday evening by County Clerk Jones to George E. Van Orden and Nancy E. Lagrange, both of Elk City. The ceremony will probably be performed today. Our congratulations to the young people are cheerfully extended.

At the republican primaries held at the court house yesterday there were 36 votes cast. T. J. Buford, W. H. Alexander, J. A. Hall and A. O. Krogstad were elected delegates to the county convention which meets at Toledo next Wednesday.

The mystery of the big tracks mentioned in last weeks paper as being discovered by Bob Campbell has been satisfactorily explained. Kenyon were arrested last Monday at Corvallis on a warrant issued March 11, during the absence of the defendants in California. The complaint charges them with adultery, and was sworn out by Chas. Kenyon, husband of Mrs. Kenyon. Both were bound over to \$600 bonds to await the action of the grand jury, which convenes on April 9.

DIED. CARD—At the home of her son in Waterloo, Linn county, Oregon, on Saturday, March 24, 1894, Mrs. Phoebe Card, aged 86 years. Grandma Card, as she has been long called, was one of the pioneers of Oregon. She came to the state from Minnesota in 1864 and in company with her family moved to Yaquina Bay in 1865, since which time she has been well known and greatly loved by almost every resident of Yaquina Bay. She had apparently been in her usual good health until a few days before her death. The giving away of her physical strength before the ravages of old age was the cause of her demise.

In the death of Grandma Card every family of old settlers on the Bay feel that they have lost a true personal friend, and in many households will sadly miss her cheerful visits. She was kind and always ready to help in sickness, and her many acts of Christian charity will keep her memory green with many Yaquina Bay families. She was interred in the Waterloo cemetery on Sunday.

The republican county convention next Wednesday promises to be something more than the tame affair the populist convention was. There are going to be strong contests over each of the important county offices. The fight for county judge seems to be between S. V. E. and J. O. Stearns, and the prospects are that it will be a fight to the finish. Three candidates are now in line for sheriff, Bert Baldwin, of Lower Alsea, and Frank Stanton, of Toledo. This would seem to give Stanton the lead unless they pool their chances against him. The clerkship fight will be a bitter one unless John Buckley refuses to go into the convention. If Buckley and Brasfield both go into the convention it will probably be the hottest fight of all of them. For assessor, there seems to be no particular fight and it will probably go to Silas Howell, of Weldport, should he seek it. He was a candidate once before for the same nomination but his party turned him down. For the other offices there seems to be no struggle.
