ADJOURNED TERM.

The district court for Lincoln county convened in adjourned term last Tuesday morning with Judge Fullerton presiding. The following are the cases docketed and their disposition:

L. W. Williams vs. W. T. and L. S. Webber; decree, with \$25 as attorney's fee.

C. S. Davis et al. vs. D. P. Clark et al.; recovery of money; decree by default.

Greenburg et al. vs. Wm. Grant, et al.; recovery of money; demurrer overruled and decree granted; dismissed as to Allen Parker.

W. T. Peet, assignee, vs. Max Friendly; recovery of money; twenty days given to answer.

American Mortgage Company vs. Mary G. and Thos. J. Watson; confirmation of sale; sale confirmed.

Josephine Geary vs. John W. Geary; divorce; demurrer argued and submitted; suit withdrawn.

Belle Cosper vs. U. Mead Cosper; divorce; decree granted.

Currance Shepard vs. R. F. Baker; amended complaint filed and defendant given until September 1, to answer.

Up The River.

A LEADER man took a trip up the river as far as Little Elk this week, to gaze upon the prospects. Leaving Toledo the first thing we noticed was the busy haying scenes. John McCluskey had his hay safely in the barn and Huffman, his next neighbor, had his last load on the wagon. Passing over the ridge we noticed that Jay Dunn and Grant King, on the old Dunn ranch, had a nice lot of hay up and were hauling cordwood to market. Just above them Mr. Day and Mr. Myers have just built a new hay barn and have it partly filled. They also have a fine looking garden. Passing over Pioneer mountain we came to the camp where Mr. Cousy and Mr. Cockerell are peeling chittim bark. They had several sacks full of the fragrant bark and more drying. Going on up we passed Pioneer quarry and had to stop a few minutes and see the new channeling machine pound or drill a channel through the rock. We found Mr. Powers, the boarding

boss, mowing hay, but it was for his cow. Going on up the road we came to P. A. Miller's place and here we struck camp for the night. Mr. Miller is devoting considerable attention to fine poultry and has been very successful. He makes a specialty of brown and white Leghorns, and partridge Cochins. He has his ranch suitably divided and fenced and is making a good deal of money out of his chickens. We learned that Jack Alphin and a crew were camped up on the mountain peeling chittim bark, and so that night Mr. Miller and myself climbed the hill to see him. We found him located in a neat little shack with a bright camp fire in front, and spent a few minutes listening to his wisdom and wit. On the road the next morning we passed the Trapp ranch, one of the land marks on the river. They were building an addition to their hay barn to hold the fine crop of hay which they were putting in the shock. They have a nice band of sheep which appear to be doing well. We found our friend Hollister doing his morning chores and spent a few pleasant moments with him. At Chitwood we made our next stop, and interviewed our acquaintances. Mr. Whitney, the merchant and postmaster, showed around and entertained us for a time. He also showed us a sample of rock on his place, of which mention is made elsewhere. Our next stop on the road was at Eddyville, where we halted for lunch and horse feed. Here we found Uncle Israel Eddy hauling in his hay into his barn. He kindly took us in and cared for both man and beast. Mr. Eddy has a fine ranch. After dinner we strolled up the road to Little Elk. On the way we stopped at the neat little ranch of Dan'l Weltin, and found him just cleaning up after putting his last load of hay in the barn. At Little Elk we found blacksmith, Billy Wilson, pounding merrily away, and he reported plenty of work. C. C. McBride, the merchant, was busily engaged in remodeling the interior of his store. While here we were sorry to learn that there is considerable illness on Little Elk, among the others who are ill is our old friend Dr. Wakefield, who had been afflicted with an attack of cholera morbus. We trust that the ill ones will soon recover.
