There are but two bathing places of any note on the northwest Pacific coast, that of Clatsop beach and the Yaquina Bay beach. By the latter we include Seal Rocks, Newport, Nye Creek and Big Creek. The beach at Clatsop is a fine beach, but there is a dangerous undertow in the surf that annually claims a greater or smaller number of victims. It has added recently another to its long list of victims, Judge Wiswall, of Vancouver, who was drowned while bathing in the surf there one day last week. On account of this ever present danger at Clatsop the great crowds of summer bathers are deserting that place and coming to Yaquina bay. This accounts, in a measure, for the great crowds at the Bay resorts this year. In the surf here there is no dangerous undertow. A strong swimmer is as safe outside the breakers as inside. There never has been a drowning at Yaquina bay that could have been attributed to the treachery of the surf. For this reason, and its many other attractions, Yaquina bay is now, and will continue to be the popular summer resort and bathing place of the Pacific northwest.

There has been a complete crop failure in that country on account of the drought. The people are greatly disheartened and downcast. She states that during her two months stay there she only had one or two messes of green vegetables of any kind. She was glad enough to return to Oregon.

There must have been a larger crowd in attendance than was anticipated and the grub run short, at any rate our reporter informs us that one crowd of young people on their way home next morning stopped at a neighbor's garden and pulled up an armful of carrots to feed the hungry girls on.

A Newport, Oregon, letter to Colman's Rural World contains the following: "As I have spent one of the wettest winters and one of the driest ones here they ever had, (so they say) now if so, it certainly is the finest climate on earth, and right here is one of the most charming spots to pass the time—winter or summer. The mutton of these hills is the best in the world. All this region needs to make it the garden spot of the earth is population, and when our railways begin to carry passengers at the same rate as freight, which they should be compelled to do, all will be well. Why not? Almost three-fourths of their net profits are from freight. If they were to carry us as freight it would add another three-fourths to their net profits. Remember that some six-sevenths of us never travel because of high charges, and the other seventh go as little as possible."

Accident At Yaquina.

Gordon Robertson, the foreman of the O. P. bridge gang, met with a serious accident at Yaquina yesterday morning. They were driving piles under the warehouse at that place when a piece of scaffolding overhead gave way and fell, striking Mr. Robertson on the head, inflicting a severe and dangerous wound. Medical aid was summoned and what assistance that was possible was rendered to him. Mr. Robertson is a popular young man, and his friends all along the line will earnestly hope for his speedy recovery.

The Tariff Bill Passed.

The long drawn agony is over and congress has disposed of the tariff bill by the House agreeing to the senate amendments. The most important of these amendments are those placing a duty on coal, iron and sugar. The bill was finally passed on Monday. The vote stood 182 for and 107 against. The populists voted for the bill or were absent. After the bill was agreed to the House passed separate bills placing coal, iron, sugar and barbwire on the free list. The tariff bill as passed makes an average reduction of about 40 per cent from the McKinley bill.

President Cleveland has not signed the river and harbor bill yet. It will become a law on Saturday without his signature, unless he vetoes it before that time.
