The Volanta brought up a couple of government scows from Newport yesterday, and brought along the quarry tools. Work begins at the today. We have not learned how large a force will be employed.

A Narrow Escape.

The Corvallis Times gives the following account of a narrow escape which occurred near Newport last week:

A mile or more north of the mouth of the bay at Newport two rocky points nearly 100 yards apart jut out into the ocean. The spot last week was the scene of an exciting incident. At very low tide persons can pass around both points, and on the occasion mentioned, a party consisting of Dr. Bowen, Lester and Miss Anna Allen, of Corvallis, and Messrs. Edgar Martin and Henry Mackaye, of Portland, were attempting the passage. The tide was coming in and the first point was passed after much difficulty. The second point was reached and considerable time spent in trying to get around it, but finding it impossible the party gave it up. Back to the first point they went in a hurry, only to find that the incoming tide had cut off escape in that direction. Then the hair rose straight up on the heads of all. They were completely cornered with the sheer walls behind them and with the big breakers creeping steadily nearer in front of them. Finally a place where escape did not seem impossible was discovered close to where the big rollers dashed against the foot of the cliff. The party made for it, over the slick boulders. Progress was slow and before it was reached Dr. Lester spied a big breaker coming and made a jump to get out of the way. The doctor hates bathing in the salt sea, and is a neat man withal. He had his neatness and his dislike of salt water with him at the time and longed to escape that wave. He didn't though, for his foot slipped and he went sprawling. The big roller soused him under and he arose drenched to the hide, his shirt front and hair filled with sea weed, sand and mussel shells. Mr. Martin was also caught and drenched above his waist. Finally the point was reached, but after getting within ten feet of the top the party was about to give up the attempt, when a shout from above attracted their attention. A man's head appeared over the precipice, and with a long pole he assisted the party out of the snap, and all still live to tell the tale of their narrow escape from death.
