The Elections.

The elections which were held in most of the states last Tuesday seem to be largely a landslide to the republican party. At this writing there are but meager returns to judge by but enough is known to estimate that the republicans have carried every Northern state except Nebraska and California. Morton defeats Hill in New York by over 100,000 majority. It is estimated that the next lower house of congress will be close between the republicans and democrats with the balance of power held by the populists.

The whistling buoy which went adrift from off the mouth of the Bay a few days ago has drifted ashore just south of Otter Rock. Bids have been received for the contract of hauling it back to Newport. This will be considerable of a job as it must be hauled along the beach and up over two hills. The buoy is thirty feet in length and the weight is enormous.

A gentleman who is presumed to be posted, stated in our hearing recently that there was a strong combination being made against Senator Dolph in the coming senatorial contest. The combine is said to embrace Binger Hermann, Judge Lord, Thos. Tongue, Charley Fulton and several smaller lights in the republican ranks. If the information is correct the contest at Salem this winter will lack very much of being devoid of interest.

Our show window has received several contributions since our last issue, and the handsome, large and well formed fruit and vegetables that we have received plainly indicates that there is no lack of a fertile soil and congenial climate in Lincoln county. Mrs. Espey gave some nice specimens of hill land potatoes. Elizabeth Graham's orchard furnished two big Glori Mundi apples that weighed a little over two pounds. Jos. Blower, of Mill Four, brought in some mangels, rutabagas and parsnips that were very fine. He also brought in some specimens of millet grown on his farm that is certainly first-class, but the best sample he brought us was a fine basket of home grown grapes. They were handsome clusters and were of good size and excellent flavor. He informs us that he has several vines in bearing and that they all do well. He also has experimented some in tobacco culture and has met with very good success. W. J. Hollister sent us down some nice Ben Davis apples, and an unknown variety, from his orchard near Chitwood.

The Creamery Question.

To the farmers of Lincoln county: Do you want a creamery located in your county, or do you want to see Tillamook butter shipped to Yaquina Bay, thereby advertising to the world that our evergreen hills and fertile bottoms are only fit for skunk cabbage and wild blackberries?

If you want a creamery, call meetings at your school houses and get each farmer to pledge himself to milk from one to twenty cows, according to his means or ability, and send in your report to the Creamery Committee, at Toledo, on or before the 17th of November.

We are assured that a creamery will be built in Lincoln county if sufficient milk can be secured to justify parties to buy the necessary plant.

We have been investigating the creamery business during the past ten days, in company with John D. Daly, and have visited some of the largest creameries on the coast, and are more than ever satisfied that our county has no equal in Oregon as a dairying country. But of this we need not speak for we are all aware of that fact.

At the Vancouver creamery, in Washington, they have a capacity of 1,500 gallons daily. The foreman, who is an owner in the concern, informed us that they paid \$1.20 for milk that would make four pounds of butter, and that the milk used at their creamery would average one-half pound of butter to one gallon of milk, which is no doubt better than we could expect to do in this county for a year or two, or at least until we have advanced and improved our stock. But if these people in Washington can afford to pay fifteen cents per gallon for milk and run a creamery and make money out of the concern, and if farmers in Washington can afford to sell their milk and ship it a hundred miles, as we were informed many of them did, we, in this county, under many favorable circumstances, should be able to make money at prices one-third less, and keep our money at home, whereas we now are compelled to buy everything and have nothing to sell.

Notice.

An act to amend section 2231 of the Revised Statutes of the United States relating to mining claims. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section 2231 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, which requires that on each claim located after May 10, 1872, and until such time as the same shall be located by the local laws and mining regulations shall be subject to forfeiture for non-performance of the annual assessment for the year 1894: Provided, That the claimant or claimants of any mining location, in order to secure the benefits of this act, shall cause to be recorded in the office, where the location notice or certificate is filed, on or before December 31, 1894, a notice that he or they in good faith intend to hold and work said claim: Provided, however, That the provisions of this act shall not apply to the State of South Dakota.

SEC. 2.—That this act shall take effect from and after its passage.
