The South Tualatin creamery, for the month of February, made and marketed 6,155 pounds of butter and supplied only two-thirds of the orders placed with the Portland agent. To make one pound of butter 21.29 pounds of milk were required. From one pound of butter fat 1.24 pounds were made. The net value of the butter fat for the month was 25.34 cents per pound. The milk netted the dairyman \$1 per hundred weight.

They have kept this country from feeling the hard times prevalent elsewhere. Butter has remained at a good price, while other farm products have been depreciated greatly.—Headlight.

For many years quite an extensive trade has been done in this state in cascara bark, or bark of the chittim wood, which is highly valued in medicine, and which is found here in greater quantities probably than in any other state in the Union. Heretofore the bark has mostly been shipped East, where the liquor extracts and compounds have mainly been manufactured. Recently parties at Portland started the manufacture of essence of peppermint and have started in to manufacture extract of cascara bark, Oregon grape root, etc., to keep their plant in operation while the peppermint is growing, and have thus inaugurated another industry. There is no end to cascara bark, and it is bitter enough to make good medicine, as the value of medicine is generally estimated according to the disagreeable nature of its taste.
