A party of Toledo young people gave Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Collins a pleasant surprise party last Monday evening.

Three hundred pounds of first-class creamery butter was shipped by the Creamery company to Portland this morning.

T. Jay Buford came over from Salem last Friday and purchased the team of big grey horses of Sam Case, at Newport, for the State. He started to the Valley on Sunday. The team will be used on the reform school farm.

W. A. Gentry, supervisor of road district No. 4, has a force of men at work on the Wright's rough road. This road will soon be passable for teams over the entire route. When opened this road will be a great convenience to the people along the route.

Messrs. Schermerhorn & Co., the Portland agents for the Yaquina Bay Creamery, have acknowledged the receipt of the first shipment of butter, and they compliment the company very highly on their product. They state that the quality is equal to the best butter that is in the Portland market.

At the teachers' examination held last week certificates were granted to the following applicants: Rosa Thompson, general average 88 per cent., 2nd grade certificate; Mina Harrington, general average 90.1 per cent., 1st grade certificate; Eunice Alexander, general average 79.9 per cent., 3rd grade, and Etta Mulkey, 2nd grade.

There will be a meeting at Yaquina next Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, for the purpose of effecting a permanent organization of the Lincoln County General Improvement and Geological Survey Society. It is especially urged that all who have the development of the county's latent resources at heart to attend. A lecture on geology will be delivered in the evening.

H. R. Sturdevant and family, and Mrs. J. P. O'gram and daughter, constitute a party which arrived in Lincoln county this week. They are from Vining, Clay county, Kansas, and come to seek homes in a land where the drought, cyclone, chinch bug, grasshopper and hot wind are unknown. Mrs. O'gram is the mother of L. M. Starr, of this place, and Mr. Sturdevant is his brother-in-law. In a short talk with the latter gentleman he informed us that the spring in Kansas had been very warm and dry up to the time of his coming away, the thermometer being above the hundred point at one time. That is pretty hot for May, but it's nothing for Kansas.

John and Eli Gaither brought some cattle over from the reservation last Monday.

The freight business on the railroad seems to be increasing lately, judging from the size of the freight trains.

John Lewis, of Newport, who has been near Silverton teaching school for the past six months, returned last Saturday.

Judge Hufford came over from Corvallis Monday evening. While here he figured as counsel in the case of the State vs. Abie Logan, appearing for the defendant.

John Gaither went to Summit this morning where he will temporarily relieve the railroad agent at that place. He does not know how long he will be gone.

Lewis and Campbell have about got their store completed, and their stock of goods is partly in. They are fixing it up very neatly, and when fully arranged it will be a very nice store.

Our old friend Wm. Brazelton, on Ollala, has the boss brand of creamery cows. He has had six calves from five cows this spring, and every one of them are heifer calves.

We learn that G. W. Roper, who was looking this country over some time ago, has reached his home at Indianola, Nebraska, and from what we gather, is an enthusiastic talker for Oregon.

Ted Parker and John Lucas made a trip to Otter rock last Saturday. They had an adventure with a bear on the beach, but every time they tell about it to the bear gets larger, and we will wait for a week or two to give the details of the affair to see how large the bear will grow.

The schooner Kate and Ann came into the lower bay Monday and is now tied up at Parker's mill. Capt. Lutjens will take his crew over to the cove above Otter rock where they will camp and hunt otter from the shore for some time.

A couple of gentlemen from Polk county are in this county buying cattle to drive to the ranges of Eastern Oregon. They are paying good prices for stock and are anxious to buy. Long Prairie Sam, an Indian on the reservation met with a very serious accident last Monday. He was driving a team that was somewhat shy to a wagon, and the wagon run into a rut throwing him out striking his head on a rock, cutting and tearing his scalp nearly off. Dr. Hardin went and patched up his head and the prospects for his recovery is very fair.

W. J. Hollister, of Chitwood, was down last Monday and made arrangements to put a milk wagon on the route from Chitwood down. He will start his wagon next Monday and expects to deliver not less than 600 pounds of milk from Pioneer up, from the start. He will also deliver the milk from several customers this side of Pioneer mountain. He will haul the milk in a spring wagon and will start from his place about 6 o'clock in the morning, reaching the creamery at not later than 9:30. We are glad to note that this arrangement has been made, as it provides for the delivery of the milk of some forty or fifty good cows that it has been feared it would be impossible to get.

Quite a fight was made against Henry Wulf's petition for a liquor license last Friday. The court, however, ordered the license issued upon the filing of a good and sufficient bond by Mr. Wulf. The bond was filed on Saturday with Jas. Robertson and August Haberman, as sureties, and the license was duly issued.

The Corvallis Times man is mistaken when he says that the coal operations mentioned last week, were caused by a notice in the Times some months ago. Dr. Bryant, the Los Angeles man referred to, became interested in the Lincoln county coal fields months before the notice was published in the Times. Messrs. Bensell, Ayles, Jones and Crosno were instrumental in waking the matter up.

The Walluski has the contract for towing for the new stone contractor and goes into service today. She leaves for Newport this evening with Capt. Chatterton at the wheel and Mort Lollis, chief engineer. Both of these men are old steamboat men, and will doubtless make the Walluski a success. This boat has been out of service for over two years and it is a fortunate thing for her owners if she has again got into a paying job.

A hack load of people being driven up from Newport last Saturday evening had rather an exciting adventure. It was J. H. McMurray's hack and was loaded down with six persons. When on the Grady road near town the hack run into a rut throwing the occupants all out. The team started to run and only run a short distance when one of them went off of the grade into the head of a canyon. After considerable difficulty the horse was got out, but little injured by the fall.

SILETZ PROCLAMATION

Just as we go to press we are in receipt of a message announcing the President had signed the proclamation opening the Siletz Reservation to settlement, and that it will be opened 60 days from noon, May 21. This will make July 21, the time of legal opening.

Dr. Bryant, the Los Angeles capitalist interested in the Bensell and Ayles coal interests, is expected to arrive in Lincoln county tomorrow. The diamond drill will also come up on the next steamer.

'Squire Hall's court was the scene of a lively law suit last Tuesday. Abie Logan, of Siletz, had been arrested for using foul and obscene language in public over there last Saturday. He was brought before the Toledo justice court for trial. Judge Carson appeared for the state and Judge Hufford, of Corvallis, for the defense. Several witnesses were examined and the trial lasted far into the night. The result was that Logan was convicted and fined \$5 and costs, amounting in all to a little over \$30. The fine was paid and security given for the costs, and the prisoner released.
