### The Siletz Reservation.

Register Miller, of the land office, put in most of his time last Friday answering questions relative to the opening of the Siletz Indian reservation to settlement. The dispatch in Friday's Oregonian saying that the president had signed the proclamation was sufficient to set land-seekers moving, as had been the case two or three times before, all wanting information that would enable them to secure claims the moment the land is eligible to entry. Anxious inquirers were told not to worry about the matter; that they would have ample notice of the time when filings would be received at the land office, and of the special regulations governing the manner of acquiring title to these particular lands.

The law under which the Siletz reservation is to be opened says that the secretary of the interior shall, under such regulations as he may prescribe, "open said land to settlement after proclamation by the president and 60 days' notice." It is presumed that the notice will be given through the regular channel, and that after such notice is published from the land office here there will be 60 days in which intending settlers may make due preparations for entering their claims. Sixty days' notice being required by the law, the announcement that the reservation would be opened next Tuesday must be a mistake. Not more than a third of the reservation has yet been surveyed, so far as the records of this land office show.

The Siletz reservation is 24 miles long, north and south, and from 14 miles at the north to 17 miles at the south in width. Of its 366 sections there are approved plats of only 114 sections now in the land office. These sections are along the course of the Salmon river, in the northern part of the reservation, on Devil lake, on Siletz bay, and along the Siletz river, and practically all are occupied by the Indians. The northeastern two-thirds is not so desirable as the land on the coast and rivers, and much of it is said to be yet unexplored. The law provides as follows for the disposal of the vacant lands of this reservation:

"Mineral lands shall be disposed of under the laws applicable thereto, and the balance of the land so ceded shall be disposed of, until further provided by law, under the townsite law and under the provisions of the homestead law. Providing, however, that each settler, under and in accordance with the provisions of said homestead laws, shall, at the time of making his original entry, pay the the sum of 50 cents per acre in addition to the fees now required by law, and at the time of making final proof shall pay the further sum of \$1 per acre, final proof to be made within five years from the date of entry, and three years, actual residence on the land shall be established in homestead proofs as a prerequisite to title or patent."

The townsite law authorizes the president to reserve from public lands townsites on the shores of harbors, at the junction of rivers, important portages or any natural or prospective center of population. For a town of less than 200 inhabitants, the county judge may enter not to exceed 320 acres of land so settled and occupied, at \$1.25 per acre, the judge to hold in trust for the settlers according to their respective interests. The entry of the land must be made, however, or a declaratory statement of the purpose of the inhabitants to enter it as a townsite must be filed with the register of the land office prior to the commencement of the sale of the body of the land in which it is included. To be eligible to take a homestead one must be a citizen of the United States or must have declared his intention of becoming one; must be the head of a family or be 21 years of age; must not be the proprietor of more than 160 acres of land; must subscribe to an affidavit showing the foregoing facts and that the application is made in good faith to obtain a home, and not for speculation, and the applicant must have been on the land and swear these is no mineral on it.—Oregonian.
