The receipts of milk at the creamery at Coquille continues to increase rapidly. On Tuesday of last week there was 8,500 pounds and by Thursday it raised to 9,500 and still goes up.

A man who has been appointed receiver went to a lawyer and asked: "Out of \$20,000 passing through his hands how much ought a receiver to profit?" "Well, about \$19,000," was the reply. "Only \$19,000," he exclaimed, "who is to get the other thousand, I'd like to know?"

Frank Hampton, who has been operating in cattle in the Willamette valley during the winter, arrived in Prineville Thursday. He believes there has been near 7,000 young cattle bought and shipped out of that valley during the past winter and spring, average price \$10 per capita.

The Albany creamery commenced operations Tuesday. At present the creamery has the milk of about 400 cows, but more is promised. A special rate over the S. P. is given for milk sent from Jefferson to the creamery. A five gallon can of milk is delivered at Albany for five cents, the cans being returned free of charge. A ten gallon can costs 8 cents charges.
