W. I. Steele, of Corvallis, representing the school furniture house of C. F. Weber & Co. is canvassing Lincoln county.

Rev. L. M. Butler and family and Mrs. Chas. Tillison and children went to the beach today where they will camp for a few days.

There are large numbers of campers at Otter Rock this year. This place is bound to be one of the most popular places on the coast for outing parties.

A magic lantern show took place a couple of nights this week at the court house. The show is said to have been fairly good, but the audience was "out of sight."

Mrs. R. McConnell came over from Albany last week, and has shipped her household goods from here to Wren station, near which place they have bought a big stock farm.

Mrs. Hodges, mother of Chas. Matthews, and Mrs. Jas. Hodges, are at Chas. Dick's, in this place, waiting for the steamer to go California. Jas. Hodges has already gone to California.

Petitions are being circulated asking that a board of examining surgeons be appointed in Lincoln county to examine all applicants for pensions. There are about sixty pensioners in Lincoln county and it works a material hardship on them to have to appear at Albany or Independence for examination.

The Hansen-Loveall case has bobbed up again and will be a matter for the grand jury to investigate. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Carson has subpoenas issued for B. F. Loveall, Jas. P. Wolfe, C. Luderman, Martin Lyons and Alfred Colson to appear before the grand jury at this place next week. The serving of subpoenas and the per diem and mileage of the witnesses will cost the county about \$100 each.

Assessor Parker is at work in the south part of the county, and will soon have the field work of the assessment done. He informs us that the census enumeration will show a strong and healthy increase in the population. He estimates that the number of legal electors, outside of the Indians, will be between 1,000 and 1,100, a gain of about 100 during the past year. The census roll of but two precincts have been made up, as yet, Nashville and Little Elk. The rolls show Nashville to have a population of 141, and Little Elk 169.

Supt. Bethers is visiting the schools of the south part of the county.

A. J. Rader is building a neat little dwelling house on his property at this place. He proposes to put a stop to paying rent.

Troy Mays says that it was Albany lager beer vs. Pine Tree bitters, at Elk City Tuesday afternoon and the beer came out victorious and put the bitters to flight.

The first seaside excursion of the season will be run over the O. C. & E. next Sunday to Newport. The excursions start in a little late this year.

A larger and better crop of hay will be put up in Lincoln county this year than ever has been before. Our farmer friends tell us that the hay crop has been exceptionally good.

On account of being called away from home over next Sunday, July 21, Rev. F. J. Strayer has withdrawn appointment at Toledo, but will preach at Toledo August 12th, both forenoon and evening.

Judge Kelsay came over yesterday to look up some of the cases in the district court in which he is attorney. The Judge is looking quite well for a man of his years, but we are sorry to see him take to wearing a tall plug hat at this season of the year.

Judge Kelsay, the Nestor of the Benton county bar, completed his fiftieth year in the practice of law on the 9th inst, having been admitted to the bar in Missouri in 1845. The Judge is 75 years of age, and still has a clear and active brain. He says that he has lost none of his mental or physical vitality, and his hosts of friends all stand ready to testify that the swiftly passing years have robbed the Judge of none of his gallantry toward the fair sex.

We hope that the case of State vs. Job, Job and Davis will be tried in the coming term of court. Nearly two years have passed since the indictment was found and it is time the case was tried. It has already proven a heavy burden to the county and should not be allowed to continue longer. Give them a fair trial, and if they are guilty send them to the penitentiary, and if they are not then acquit them.

Quite a number of Yaquina people have made up a party and will start for the gold fields of Del Norte county, California, at an early date. Next Thursday, the 25th, at noon the Siletz reserve will be opened for settlement. It is not expected that there will be any great rush to file on these lands, as it will take some time for prospective settlers to locate and learn the numbers of their prospective homesteads. But we think, however, that the settlement will be continuous and steady and in the course of a year will add many new settlers to the population of Lincoln county. There are many people now camping in various parts of the county waiting for noon of the 25th to come.

The LEADER job office will print the bar docket for the July term of circuit court. This work will be at the expense of the county clerk, the court having refused to have them printed, as they do in other counties.

Gen. W. H. Odell's election to be clerk of the state board of school land commissioners in the place of Geo. W. Davis, leads one to believe that the "new deal" promised in the last election, is being dealt from the same old political pack. Gen. Odell has held a state or national appointment almost continuously, back as far as memory of man runneth.

A couple of traveling peddlers have opened up a lot of cheap John goods in Grady's building, and will try to sell them out to our people. These people have a right to peddle and sell to every body they can get to buy of them, but before anyone buys of them they ought to pause long enough to ask themselves whether or not it will pay them. On the other hand, the home merchants, or merchants in our county, help to bear the burden of taxes, help to educate your children, and the profit they make on the goods they sell you is always spent right among you, and the money is thus circulated at home. Besides he is bound to sell you an article correctly represented, for if he don't he is where you can easily get at him, and he knows that he will lose your trade if he cheats you. Stand together! Trade with home people and let peddlers alone.

Judge Fullerton has set an adjourned term of the district court at Corvallis for Tuesday, July 30. Court does not convene in Lincoln county until July 22, and there are thirty-nine cases on the docket, one of which is a criminal case. The McDowell case will come from the grand jury as a true bill, and the trial of this case alone will occupy the greater part of the week. If the grand jury returns other indictments the whole of the first week will be taken up in State cases. We do not understand why Judge Fullerton should set an adjourned term at Corvallis at the time he did. It was at his urgent request that the time of holding court in Lincoln county was changed, and he stated to the editor of this paper at Salem last winter, that if the term time was changed to July that there would be ample time to clear the docket. We hope that when Judge Fullerton arrives here he will hold court a sufficient length of time to clear the docket. There are numerous cases that have been carried over from term to term, and they are an expense and burden to the county.
